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HELPING THE LETTER CARRIERS

A circular letter to the public issued by the Postmaster will be distributed by the letter carriers in a few days to places where no opening or letter box has been installed. The intention is to have a "letter drop" or similar device in the front doors of all residences or stores so that mail matter may be securely placed and that the letter carriers may effect delivery without calling persons to the door to receive the mail. An attractive letter drop plate improves the appearance of a door, and if the general public will respond to this appeal it will never be necessary for anyone, whether landlord or tenant, to install more than one box. There is no doubt that parties installing boxes will be more than repaid by the great advantage which will derive by the delivery of mail matter during their temporary absence from home or when they might be engaged in a remote part of the house. A letter carrier will call upon all persons to whom these circulars are delivered and it is hoped that the people will give the carriers such assurances as will enable them to report a hearty co-operation by the public in bringing this city up to date and improving conditions in regard to the delivery of mail matter.

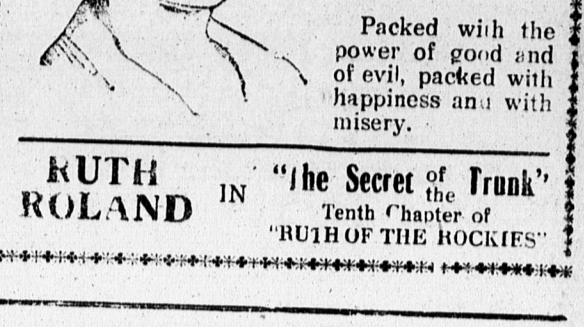
