DAINTY POWDER PUFFS

Powder puffs look so attractive when they are new, but they very quickly become soiled with regular use.

Luckily it is quite easy to keep them always fresh and dainty by giving them an occasional "shampoo" if lambwool or swansdown ones are chosen.

Make a warm tinner with soap flakes and, after shaking them free from loose powder, dip the puffs up and down in this water...

MILDEW STAINS

Straight Talk to Wife Whose Life is Blighted Because Husband Danced With Show-girl—Why is Husband's Mother Cold-Shouldered in Favor of Wife's?

Dear Miss Dix—I am fast approaching middle age. My husband and I have lived very happily for years. He has been one of the world's finest, devoted to me, the children and home.

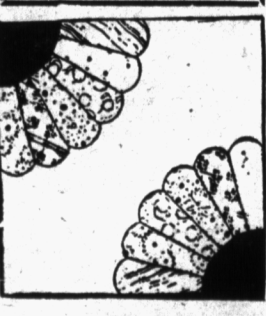

Price of PATTERN is 6 cents in stamps or coin (coin is preferred.) Wrap coin carefully.

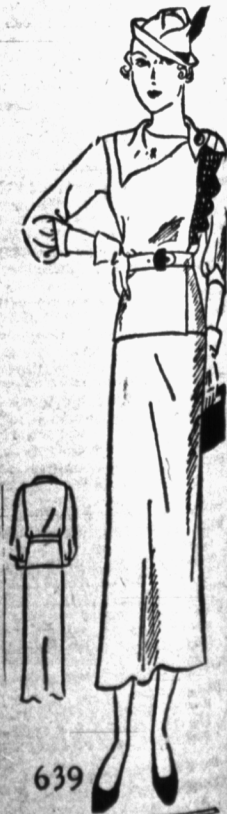
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THE SCHOOLHOUSE DRAWING ROOM
