There was a great number of visitors to Charlottetown on Saturday, Easter Market. The incoming trains brought a great many in the morning and the city was crowded during the afternoon. At the times the trains left on return south, east and west the railway station was thronged.

As a result of the day's business many stores find their cash receipts much in excess of the usual Saturday's trade. The day was fine and clear and, though the travelling in the country and on the city streets was poor and the walking disagreeable, business did not suffer to any great extent.

The sad news has been received by Mrs. Andrew MacLeod, Stanley Bridge, of the accidental death of her son Townsend, which occurred on March 22 in Spokane, Wash. The deceased was employed as brakeman on a train and as near as can be learned the derailing of cars caused an accident in which he was killed. (Owing to the distance and the uncertainty of transportation of this time of the season the body was buried in Vancouver. The funeral took place on March 27th from the house of the deceased's sister Mrs. A. C. Stewart. The unfortunate young man who was scarcely twenty-nine years of age and leaves to mourn, besides his mother, two brothers—Clair and Gordon MacLeod who live in Stanley Bridge, also a number of sisters all living abroad. She was a great sufferer for many months but bore her sickness with much patience and Christian fortitude and leaves to mourn five sisters and one brother: Mrs. Brennick and Mrs. Burns, at Fodhla; Bridget, Kate, Hannah, and John at home. The pall-bearers were Joseph Redmond, John Kelly, Harry Weatherby, Venanche Curley, Ludlow Jenkins, and Spurgeon Jenkins, High Mass was celebrated by very Rev. Dr. Morrison of Vernon River.

Miss Helen McKinnon, of the nursing staff of the Red Deer Memorial Hospital, died on Monday at the Hospital from typhoid fever at the age of 22 years. Deceased was a niece of Miss McKinnon, head of the W. E. Lord Co., dressmaking department, and care from Prince Edward Island. The funeral service was held in the Presbyterian church on Thursday afternoon. Rev. Mr. Brown conducted the service. The deep sympathy felt for the relatives at the sudden cutting off of a bright and promising young life, while at the post of duty was evidenced by the large turnout at the church, and the beautiful floral offerings from the Hospital Board, the Hospital staff, the Order of the Eastern Star, and a large number of private friends. The Hospital Board and Hospital Staff were present, practically in a body, and Miss Isabel McKinnon had the association in her grief of President and Mrs. Tallman and the Lady Superintendent, Miss Kingston—Red Deer, Alta., Exe. Miss McKinnon was a daughter of John McKinnon, North River, formerly of De Sable.

The many friends will regret to learn of the serious illness of Holden Stevenson, Fredericton—Miss Maggie Stevenson of Cornwall has returned home after visiting friends and relatives of this vicinity. Refuse Division, No. 201, S. O. P., Fredericton, is in a very flourishing condition. A very efficient staff of officers have been installed for the current quarter—Mrs. Wm. Murray of Fredericton is in Clyde River where she has been attending the funeral of her father, Wm. Fraser of that place.

Fatal results were very narrowly averted in an accident near Charlottetown recently. One night last week some very loud shouting was heard by a resident near Belvidere as he was returning from Charlottetown. Thinking it was some young chaps out on a time he let it pass unnoticed but the next day he began to ponder a little over the shouting. His curiosity demanded gratification. Rather earnest inquiry elicited the information that revealed the following story. Two attendants at the Hospital for the Insane at Palconwood had been to Charlottetown for the evening and between nine and ten o'clock were returning home. Crossing the ice they were approaching the Hospital and decided to leave the main track and make the usual short cut to the grounds. Just after leaving the track the two were suddenly plunged up to the neck in the icy waters and it was then that the loud cries were heard across the ice. Neither of the two could swim and they found themselves in a nasty predicament. According to the story told by one of the unfortunate men, he floundered around in the water a minute or so and catching the edge of the ice worked his way around to where his companion was hanging on. Getting up to him he got out over the other's shoulders and then assisted his friend to safety. Cold, tired and wet the two carefully wended their ways to their apartments where they changed and retired, reflecting on their narrow escape and thankful for it.
