Dr. MacDonald Scores Success

Cardigan Meeting Indicates Continued Trend Of Campaign In King's County.

Despite the inclement weather and bad road conditions there was a large attendance at the joint political meeting at Cardigan on Wednesday night. The chairman was Mr. Russell MacLeod.

Dr. A. A. MacDonald, the Conservative candidate, and Mr. H. F. McPhee, were given an enthusiastic reception.

It was intended that Senator John A. MacDonald of Cardigan would take some of Mr. McPhee's time but Dr. Grant, Liberal candidate, entered strong protest and pressed the issue. The crowd voiced disapproval of the Liberal member's attitude.

Dr. Grant, the first speaker, referred to MacDonald's statement that the money for King's County at the same rate when the province was away through illness as when it was at Ottawa. He claimed the estimates were voted before he became ill.

The speaker read from a report, which he received from Charlottetown, of the extent and amount of public works carried on in King's County during the two years immediately following the election of the MacLeods.

Dr. Grant made scathing unsuccessful attempts to refute statements of his opponent made at the Georgetown meeting.

He admitted he had done nothing for Cardigan as Senator MacDonald had made a "good job" of looking after the place.

The speaker reviewed the record of the King Government and accused his Conservative opponent of using destructive criticism in this campaign.

Dr. Grant boasted that he would be elected on Mackenzie King's name and that he didn't have to make promises this time.

He expressed concern about the formation of the new Government. This would require at least a month, he declared, and would hamper the prosecution of the war.

Dr. Grant should name his cabinet before the election.

The speaker accused Dr. MacDonald of bringing "hoodlums" to the Georgetown meeting for the purpose of heckling him. "He went to the house to get them," Dr. Grant said. "He brought an expedition of hoodlums, who claimed he was not a political candidate, yet he spoke for the Conservative party."

Dr. Grant boasted of dismissing two potato inspectors in the adjacent district of Lorne Valley.

He stated that "perhaps I made too many promises because everyone was out of work."

He went on to tell his listeners that this was "a very prosperous country at present."

In closing, he referred to the poor order in Georgetown Hall, where he had been tendered a very poor reception at the joint political meeting for the purpose of heckling him.

When Dr. Grant resumed his seat one of the audience, Mr. Angus MacGillivray, asked the question, "What is the cause of the emigration of many boys and girls to overseas?" His question was ignored.

Mr. MacGillivray said he had three sons enlisted himself. "They were forced to enlist because they could not find work and Dr. Grant refused to allow them work on the road," he declared.

Dr. MacDonald said that his opponent was not sticking to the questions of the war, and referred to the need for careful handling of the truth on a public platform. Hon. M. R. McGuigan, M.L.A., asked his listeners to review the records of the candidates in the field before deciding who should lead them during the next few years. He said the issue was not all about the war and the man who was to lead the people must be considered a statesman, yet he spoke for the Conservative party.

Mr. McPhee in his opening remarks thanked the people of Cardigan for the support they gave him in the Provincial election of last spring.

He said Mr. McGuigan's speech was that of an old timer according to him "the Conservatives had all the virtues and the Liberals all the vices and the Liberals all the virtues," (laughter).

He referred to the statement that the Conservatives were criticizing the Liberals for having an election and stated that any criticism was directed against the dissolution of Parliament without giving the public the opportunity of finding out the true state of affairs. Questions put on the order paper by members went unanswered.

"They admit that criticism caused them to dismiss Parliament," he continued, and Mr. McGuigan says that he has not proved that money was squandered. "The answer is that these proofs are buried in the archives at Ottawa," Mr. McPhee said.

In answer to Mr. McGuigan's argument about the officer's mess for the airport in Vancouver, the speaker said that the quarters could have been established for \$10,000 instead of \$94,000. "It is true that the Court set the price but they expropriated a palace," (Applause).

He read a description of the site and buildings expropriated stating that the land cost \$3,500 an acre and the main building \$48,000. Besides this there were many additional expenditures for fences, lawns, swimming pools, etc.

Rank Korda's "Four Feathers" As Spectacular Adventure Film
