Saved Suicide After Desperate Fight on Roof

BOSTON, May 2.—After a struggle on the roof of the Olympia building, 3 Tremont row, Atty. Charles Rose, 62, prevented Miss Helen Ham from plunging four stories to almost certain death. The attorney was almost exhausted when Traffic Patrolmen Fitzsimons and Sawyer arrived.

The young woman, who resides at the Y. W. C. A., works in the office of her brother, J. A. Ham, on the fifth floor. Ross saw her weeping on the fire escape early in the day, and a few minutes later she climbed upon the roof, with Ross after her.

The attorney caught her near the edge, but she put up a vigorous battle. The space was small and every instant watchers expected to see the pair plunge to the pavement. Ross was scratched and bitten and the girl's foot went through a skylight, cutting her ankle. After the patrolmen had been called, the girl was taken to the Relief Hospital and later taken to the home of her brother.

ILLINOIS CITY PLANS TO GROW 25,000,000 ROSES

PANA, Ill., May 1.—This little city, which has been furnishing 14,700,000 roses to its sister cities of the United States yearly, will probably have increased its production to 25,000,000 before the end of this year according to a survey made of the green houses now in process of construction here.

While there are 20 acres of rose growing ground under glass here now, the addition of 10 acres is contemplated, a large part of which is actually under preparation and upon which green houses are being erected.

While California leads in free growing roses, Illinois records show that this state is far ahead in growing roses for commercial purposes. There are 490,000 plants, each averaging 30 perfect roses a year at Pana. Three hundred and fifty thousand plants are under glass at Maywood, a Chicago suburb, while 300,000 plants are in bloom most of the year in Martin Grove, Illinois.

The soil here has been found by experts to be the most suitable in the country for rose culture and this, more than anything else, accounts for the development of this industry to the huge scale it has assumed. The rose plants under cultivation here are imported from England, and are known as grafted roses, having their origin in the marsh lands of the British Isles. They are continuous bloomers, summer and winter.

Duke and his Bride Closely Guarded

POLESDEN-LACEY, Surrey, Eng., May 1.—No honeymoon couple of modern times have been so closely guarded from curious public eyes as the Duke and Duchess of York. Since their arrival yesterday every approach to the lovely old country house here has been guarded night and day by Scotland yard men and police.

The lodge gates are kept locked and rangers from Windsor Castle patrol the park and lawn, keeping incessant watch. The only person who has dared approach the house was a small boy, who walked up to the gates and said that as he had never seen the Duke, he would like to look at him. He didn't get it.

The only other incident which interrupted the arrival of the perfect quiet was the arrival of an airplane which swooped low over the ground, to take pictures.

The Duke and his bride spent the day strolling about the grounds. People living in the neighborhood have not come near the house. The Duke and Duchess will remain here until Monday, then they go to Scotland and later to the continent.

FULL GROWN LEOPARD INVADES BURMA TOWN

MANDALAY, Burma, May 1.—Widespread excitement has been created among Mandalay residents by the discovery of a full-grown leopard hiding under a house in one of the most crowded quarters. The beast ranged at large for a short time, but was shot by an officer of the Irrawaddy Flotilla Company before doing any damage.

How this leopard found its way into the city is not definitely known. Some thought it came from the neighborhood of Amarapura, where there is a large area of thick jungle. Another theory was that it boarded one of the Irrawaddy steamers which ply along side the bank at night, and was thus carried to Mandalay.

It had been more than 10 years since a leopard penetrated into Mandalay, though one was killed only eight miles from the city last summer. Leopards are still common in the thick jungle which abounds in every part of Burma, but usually confine their operations to the cattle of villagers. In 1901 a leopard appeared in Basselin, Lower Burma, and killed and wounded several people before it was shot.

Tigers, also, are still common in some parts of Burma. Less than a year ago a tiger was killed only 15 miles from Rangoon, a city of 340,000. It has not been many years since a tiger entered the city of Rangoon and was found about a third of the way up a pagoda. It had climbed up in the night and was unable to get down and had to be shot from the pagoda platform.

Wild elephants are protected by law and are still to be found in some sections of the country. One member of a large herd was killed recently only 20 miles from Rangoon. Domesticated elephants are used extensively in the lumber camps for moving heavy timber.

Jungle cats and deer remain abundant, and often enter the towns. Recently a large jungle cat was killed in Rangoon, where it had chased a domestic cat into the interior of a house.

85 Million Feet of Logs May Come Out of Miramichi

FREDERICTON May 2.—Between forty-five and fifty million feet of logs are expected to be handled by the Southwest Miramichi Log Driving Corporation this season, according to estimates given by J. W. Brankley, of Chatham, who was re-elected president at the adjourned annual meeting of the company here this morning.

Mr. Brankley estimated that as many as 1,000 stream drivers would be employed on the drives on the Miramichi this year and all ready a large number of them have been sent to the streams but driving operations have not as yet commenced. Between 300 and 350 stream drivers have been sent to handle the Taxis river drives alone, the Taxis being one of the principal tributaries of the main river.

Indications now point to satisfactory conditions for stream driving on the Southwest Miramichi this year, Mr. Brankley said. There is still a good deal of snow left in the woods and the continued cold weather has conserved much of the water supply until a time when it will be most useful. A busy season is looked for at the mills on the Miramichi and elsewhere on the North Shore. Mr. Brankley stated.

COKE CONFIGURATION IS LATEST FRENCH ORDER

ESSEN, May 2.—A sweeping order providing for the confiscation of all coke in the Ruhr was issued today by the occupation forces. All coke by-products are included in the order, which explains that the action to fulfill the clauses of the treaty of Versailles providing for deliveries of coal and coke, and because there are indications that the available coke supply is diminishing. About 500 furnaces already have been shut down, and the Germans say it is only a question of time when others, along with big manufacturing plants, will also close. The use of coke for domestic purposes is prohibited, and penalties for infractions are from ten million to one hundred million marks fine with five years imprisonment. The Germans say they do not intend to comply with the order.

2,676TH BIRTHDAY OF ROME IS CELEBRATED

ROME, May 1.—The celebration today of Rome's 2,676th birthday was perhaps the most solemn in the long history of the eternal city. Premier Mussolini promulgated a decree establishing the 21st of April as labor day, instead of May 1 and thus the traditional date of the city's foundation becomes a national holiday.

A leading feature of the ceremony was the administration of the fasci by the national militia, as the troops in a hundred Italian cities were reviewed by the black-shirted leaders and by the chiefs of the army and navy. In this city, the Benito reviewed the phalanxes. Enthusiasm was without bounds. Hundreds of thousands of people crowded the streets or found positions in the windows or on the balconies. Some took up their stations on the housetops, while others climbed trees to see the procession. Mussolini's appearance was the signal for a tumultuous outburst.

As the detachments of militia passed before him, with standards flying and bugles sounding, the men took a solemn oath of absolute loyalty to the nation and to the iron discipline of fascism. Later there was a patriotic ceremony at the tomb of the unknown soldier.

Death of Logger In Chaudiere

QUEBEC, May 1.—The Chaudiere, Beloe County is rising. Florian Bolduc, a logger was drowned in raging floods.

Sowing Wheat Now in Yukon

DAWSON CITY, May 1.—Spring wheat is now being sown in the Yukon and the first stock of sheep ever wintered there have just been brought through and are at ranch on the Klondyke River.

HAVE LIFTED DUTY ON REFUGEES' FOOD

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 1.—Just as supplies for refugees were becoming exhausted, Angora consented to revoke its order against allowing food for refugees to come into Turkey free of duty. This concession was obtained from the Turks with the utmost difficulty under pressure by the American Government and relief agencies.

Experiments are being made in feeding the refugees with special fooding high in vitamins. The regular rations will be used as supplementary feeding. Tests made in Greece have already proved satisfactory, the health of the refugees there being considerably improved.

The Constantinople Labor party has decided that on May Day all workers will wear black badges as a protest against continued Allied occupation of the city.

LONDON, May 2.—Cropping the hair of the children and barring the windows have been almost entirely abandoned, with a consequent gain of the inmates' self respect asserts a report on reformatories and schools.

Any sweeping allegations that the "movies" are responsible for offences committed by children should be received with caution the report says.

Cruelty to children has diminished to a marked extent, and the children of the poorest classes are better cared for than formerly. A general improvement in the conditions under which children are reared is noted in the report which says the improvement, while due partly to the strengthening of the law can be traced more certainly to better education and to the medical attention in the schools.

There has been a decrease in drunkenness in the poorer sections of the cities and towns owing to the more strict control of the public houses and the efforts of voluntary aid societies.
