THE Mint's cargo to Pictou yesterday morning comprised 40 dressed hogs, 21 pkgs beef and mutton, 17 cases of eggs, 14 pkgs leather, 43 bbls meats, etc., 10 cases lobsters, 44 pairs and tubs lard, a quantity sun dries, 1 horse, 15 bags mail and 7 passengers. The cargo of the S. S. Stanley to Pictou Tuesday was as follows: 12 dressed hogs; 86 pkgs beef and mutton, 15 bbls meat etc. 11 pairs etc. 1,300 bushels oats, some sundries, 13 bags mail, 7 passengers.

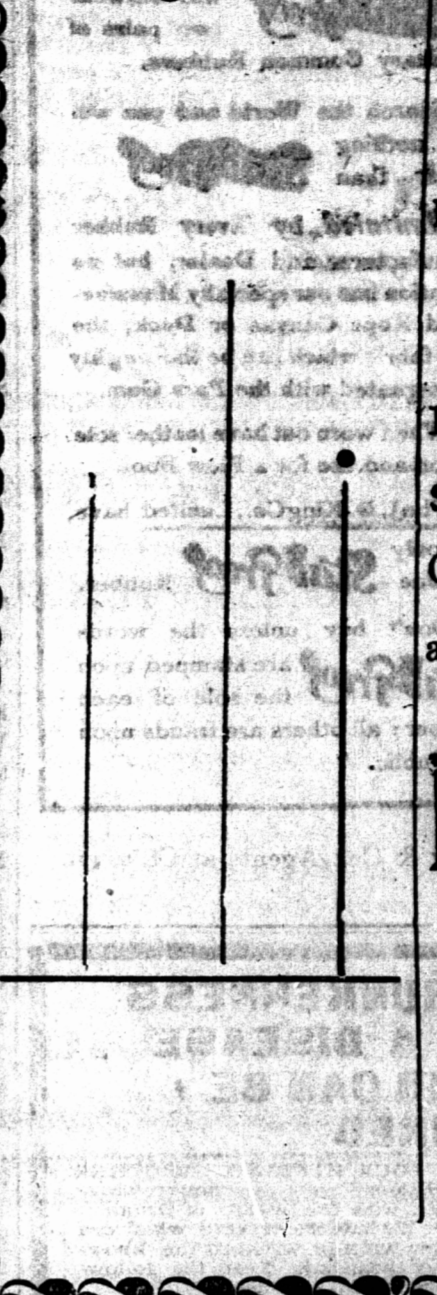
