THE regular quarterly meeting of the Fish and Game Protection Association was held in the City Building on Friday evening last. The president gave a review of the work for the last three months. The quarterly report of the Executive of the Association was then read and adopted. It was stated that the aims of the Association were being well carried out. Vice President Morrison gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would move a resolution to reduce the annual membership fee to 50 cents. On motion a regular meeting of the Association was called for Friday, June 8th, to consider the proposal. The membership roll contains the names of 241 members.

THERE were in East Queens at the last Dominion election 4,472 qualified voters and in West Queens, outside the city of Charlottetown, 2,044. This would make a total of 6,516 qualified to vote in the election for the repeal of the Scott Act on Thursday next. This is a large body of men who have a highly important question to vote upon. The Temperance Alliance are naturally desirous that a large vote shall be polled. There is need that the interest shall be stirred up as too many may think it enough that a majority for prohibition is assured. The friends of prohibition can if they will roll up a majority that will be impressive, and it ought to be done. Rally to the polls on Thursday, and mark your ballot against the Scott Act.

On Saturday night an immense crowd of people of all classes assembled outside the railway station to await the arrival of the mail train, on board of which was Madame Albani and her company, who are to appear tonight in the Market Hall. The train was twenty minutes later in arriving than was at first expected, but the waiting period was enlivened by some good music by 4th Regt. Band which was also down to welcome the great Canadian singer. On the arrival of the train at 10.20 Madame Albani and her party had to press through an eager crowd, all striving to see the prima donna. After reaching her carriage a start was made for the Hotel Victoria, the crowd accompanying and the band playing on the way. Outside the hotel the people waited and the band serenaded the distinguished visitor. Madame Albani appeared for a little while on the balcony of the second story and acknowledged the greetings which were at once addressed to her. The occasion was a remarkable one, and the spontaneous welcome one that Madame Albani should be proud of.
