CORWALL, Ont., July 27—Mitchell Sitwits, of Yellow Island near St. Regis, and Charles Left of St. Regis, two Indians about 20 years of age, were drowned in the Snye yesterday. They fell asleep while on their way home and their horse knowing the road well turned at the point where the ferry to Yellow Island is. The horses ferried the river but the passengers fell out and were drowned.

35 FOOT MOTOR BOAT CROSSING ATLANTIC

BOSTON, July 25—The 35-foot motor Detroit, Capt. Thomas Fleming Day, eastbound across the Atlantic, was spoken on July 22, 800 miles east of Boston light, by the steamer Arabic. The Detroit reported all well. She has four men on board, and is the smallest power boat that has ever ventured across the Atlantic.

JAPAN WANTS AN EXCUSE TO EXPEL FOREIGNERS

HARBIN, July 26—Japanese secret service agents arrived here from Seoul to take possession of papers which Russian authorities found on about 100 Koreans charged with complicity in a plot to assassinate ex-Premier Prince Latsure of Japan, when he passed through recently en route to St. Petersburg.

DRUNKEN MAN PUT OFF CAR AND KILLED

SYDNEY, N. S., July 26—J. W. Boutlier, a conductor employed by the Cape Britain Electric Railway, was arrested at Sydney today on a charge of manslaughter. Boutlier put a man under the influence of liquor, off his car between Sydney and Glace Bay last week.

GENERAL OTTER IS IN ST. JOHN

ST. JOHN, July 27—Major-General W. D. Otter, inspector general of the Canadian forces, arrived in the city last evening and will go to Halifax this morning. General Otter is on an inspection tour of the branches of the service in Eastern Canada.

ROBBERS LOOT VANCOUVER BANK

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 26—Two robbers held up the Northern Crown Bank at Central Park, six miles out of Vancouver, at 1 o'clock this afternoon. They had been loitering in the vicinity for half an hour, having come there with a horse and rig. They covered the manager, C.C. Temple, with a gun and also held up his assistant, Mr. Tompkins, both of whom were having lunch. They attempted to force Temple to open the safe, but he refused and one struck him over the head with a spade of leadpipe. They put Tompkins out of business in the same manner, then broke open a cash box and stole two thousand dollars. They got away in their rig. When Temple recovered consciousness, he telephoned for help, but the robbers have not yet been captured.

A BAD FIRE IN KENNEBEC MAINE

(Canadian Press) AUGUSTA, July 28—A spectacular fire on the east bank of Kennebec River, opposite the city of Augusta, tonight destroyed the saw mill and lumber yards of the Augusta Lumber Co., and the sails and rigging of the three masted schooner Lord M. Thurlow, which was tied up at the dock. The loss is estimated at \$150,000.
