FOOD CONTROL IS CONTINUED IN ENGLAND

LONDON, July 25.—A bill to extend the duration of the ministry of food till September 1922 passed its second reading in the House of Commons Friday night.

The Canadian authorities here express grave opposition to the measure. Secretary Griffiths of the high commissioner's office, says the bill gives the ministry power to determine the quantity and price of all Canadian food imported here.

CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS WILL GIVE FARES AND SPECIAL TRAIN SERVICE ON AUGUST 6TH, AND 13TH.

Harvesters are urgently needed in the West to garner in the wheat yield of Canada. Estimates are that over 200,000,000 bushels of wheat stand ready for reaping.

The Canadian National Railways is prepared for the transport of Harvesters from all parts of the System. From Maritime Province points special arrangements have been made. Reduced fares to Winnipeg are to be granted on August 6th and 13th and special trains will run via Quebec Bridge, and from Quebec to Winnipeg via the Transcontinental Line as the best and quickest route from Maritime Province points.

The fare from Charlottetown to Winnipeg is \$24.85 plus half a cent per mile to points West of Winnipeg. The return fare is half a cent per mile from all points west of Winnipeg to Charlottetown.

Hints for the Motorist

HORN AND SPEEDOMETER MAINTENANCE. Nothin' Will "Stand Up" Under Absolute Neglect.

The speedometer and the electric motor horn are two of the minor car parts which rarely receive any attention, so long as they are working properly. This is inconsiderate in view of their faithful service. A speedometer, that is driven from the front wheel, requires occasional attention to see that its driving gears remain in correct mesh; for noisy operation, rapid wear and final failure will otherwise be the result.

The clamping device, which holds the driven gear may loosen and let the parts into a stone and sometimes a tire or an accident thrown by a tire or an accident such as running the wheels against the curb disarranges the parts. The swivel gears, that drive the flexible shaft, requires an occasional packing of their housing with grease, and the speedometer shaft itself, within its flexible housing, requires lubrication, which may take the form of drawing the removed shaft through oil and re-turning it to the casing or of forcing a special grease into the casing. All speedometer makers gladly furnish instructions as to the care of their instruments. It should not be forgotten, within the electric horn housing, is a complete miniature electric motor, which drives a shaft that, in turn, vibrates the sound-producing diaphragm. This motor requires a drop or two of thin oil on its bearings, once in a while, a touch of vaseline on the steel button which acts upon the diaphragm, the cleaning of dust from its commutator and the tightening of the wire connection that supplies it with current, as well as an inspection of the contacts in the button; if it is to be kept in a dependable condition and last as long as it should, the fastening of the horn to the car should be kept tight as it is through this that its current goes to ground and commences its circuit.

J. L. writes: My car gets too hot to run and sometimes when going up a slight hill, the engine stops. It gets plenty of oil and gas. Please tell me what the trouble is? Answer: If the engine gets hotter than the radiator or becomes fully heated while the radiator or parts of it are still cool, the water circulation is stopped up somewhere. Forcing water through the radiator jackets, and piping by using a hose and putting in new rubber water-connections may set matters right. If the radiator boils so soon as the engine becomes overheated, the trouble is that the radiator is not getting rid of the heat properly and there is too much heat given out by the engine. Cleaning out the radiator with washing soda solution, tightening the fan-belt, running on as lean a mixture as possible and with the spark as early as practicable and cleaning out the muffler are remedies for these conditions. The stopping of an overheated engine is often caused by the piston sticking, because the oil becomes too thin. Are you sure that your oil is of a heavy quality, when hot? Overheated engines sometimes stop from premature self-ignition and occasionally because the mixture becomes too rich to fire.
