Leafs Crush Canadiens 7-3 In Wild Game Featured By Free-for-all

TORONTO, Jan. 29—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs strengthened their hold on third place in the National Hockey League race tonight when they downed Montreal Canadiens 7-3 in a wild, scramble game featured by a free-for-all fight in the third period.

A crowd of 10,295 fans witnessed a moderately sane contest until the early minutes of the third period when a battle royal broke out including every player on the ice. Both goal tenders joined the brawl, although their efforts were mostly by way of interference.

To add to the confusion, there was a power failure just after the brawl started and the automatic timing equipment failed to work, making it impossible for the fans or sports writers to tell what time goals were scored. The balance of the game was timed by stop watches.

The Leafs were leading 3-2 when Ken Reardon, Montreal defenseman and Bingo Kampman, Toronto rearguard, started to push each other around behind the Toronto goal. It was the signal for a free-for-all fight. Reardon and Pete Morin of the Canadiens and Lorne Carr and Wally Stanowski of the Leafs drew minors. Stanowski hurt his ankle when he tripped over a glove and retired to the dressing room instead of taking his place in the cooler. Bob Goldham was in the penalty box before the scrap started and soon after play commenced Johnny Quilty joined the penalty parade. Pete Langelle, swivel-hipped Toronto centre led the Leafs' scoring spree with three goals. He had

Shortly after their enlistment became official, the famous line left by plane for Boston to wind up their affairs, leaving still in doubt the question of whether they would play a couple more games for Bruins before starting their R.C.A.F. training in earnest.

Dumart and Schmidt are to report to the Air Force Tuesday while Bauer must return by Wednesday. As they left for Boston, the National Hockey League stars said that their main concern was to clear up their affairs in Boston, and that if they had time to spare after that, they might play for the Bruins against the Leafs in Toronto Saturday night and against Americans in New York Sunday night.

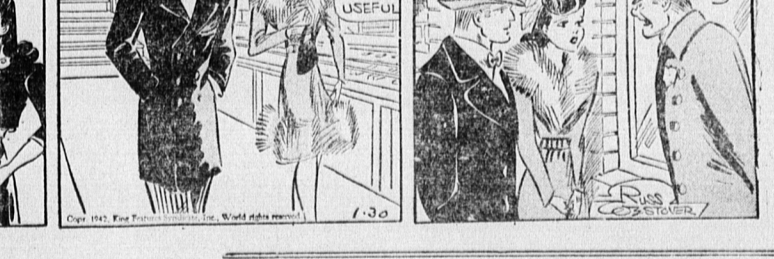
