CHARGED UNDER DEFENCE REGULATIONS — A resident of Southern Kings appeared before Magistrate B. Melish at Moncton yesterday charged under the Defence of Canada regulations. 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Born in Prince Edward Island, Cullen studied at Prince of Wales College and the University of Ottawa before entering St. Paul Seminary in 1898. Ordained Nov. 4, 1901, he was an assistant at the St. Paul Cathedral until Sept. 1902, when he became pastor of the old Immaculate Conception.

During his pastorate of nineteen years, the church became the Pro-Cathedral and later the Basilica of St. Mary. He was named president of the College of St. Thomas in September, 1921, serving six years after which he began his pastorate at St. Stephen's Church.

Father Cullen worked constantly among his 5,000 parishioners and 600 school children. In addition to his ordinary parish duties he conducted weekly round-table classes for adults and served on the archdiocesan board of education.

Because of his ability to combine forceful speaking with ready wit, Father Cullen often was called upon to speak in behalf of civic projects and at functions throughout the northwest. Thousands of Irish Catholics honored him Nov. 8, 1936 when he observed his thirty-fifth year as a pastor.

Mayor Leach said the passing of Father Cullen "is a great loss to the city of Minneapolis and to me personally. During the years I have known him I have known no more level-headed and more intelligent American citizen. His interest in everything that pertained to the welfare of Minneapolis people was of the highest order. His tolerance of the frailties of public officers and of the community's men and women won him affectionate regard."

Father Cullen was a member of the Knights of Columbus and of the Minneapolis Club. He is survived by one brother, John Cullen, of St. Paul.

The funeral services took place Oct. 3 a pontifical requiem mass was celebrated in St. Stephen's Church, following the reading of the office of the dead by the clergy. The Rev. James M. Reardon, pastor of the Basilica of St. Mary, delivered the requiem sermon. Burial was in St. Mary's cemetery, Minneapolis.

HUGE CLOTHING REQUIREMENTS FOR CANADA'S ARMIES

Some idea of the clothing requirements of Canada's potential fighting forces may be gathered from the orders that have been placed. These include 4,500 miles of drill cloth for uniforms next summer; eight miles of puttee cloth; more than two million pairs of socks and one million shirts according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Sergeants' uniforms are being turned out at the rate of three thousand a day; boots 4,700 a day; socks 6,700 pairs daily for the army and air force.

DECREASE IN UNEMPLOYMENT

The war has brought about a market change in the unemployment situation in Canada. In April 1939 there were 473,000 wage-earners unemployed and in April this year that had been reduced to 397,000, the smallest labour reserve for the month reported in a decade, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways.

Veteran Diocesan Priest Dies In Montreal

BISHOP CARROLL OFFERS PONTIFICAL MASS FOR LATE REV. FRANCIS J. HUGHES

(The Western Catholic Diocese of Calgary, Sept. 25.)

After a lengthy illness, death came to a beloved priest, the late Rev. Francis J. Hughes, on the morning of September 18 last. Retired from the active ministry since the autumn of 1936, Father Hughes, fortified by the last sacraments, died in the Jean-de-Dieu hospital in Montreal where he had been a patient for the past two years.

Father Hughes was sixty-nine years old, having been born at Bedford, P. E. I., on December 31, 1871. On completing his college course at St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, he farmed in Prince Edward Island until 1909. At this date he resumed his studies in order to attain a vocation to the priesthood. He studied Philosophy at St. Dunstan's University and made his theological course at the Grand Seminary of Quebec. He was ordained priest for the diocese of Calgary in the Cathedral at Charlottetown by the late Henry O'Leary on October 1, 1916.

Pastor At Granum

One month later Father Hughes was placed in charge of St. Augustine's Church, Granum and his missions, and had the unique experience of remaining in this parish for the remainder of his priestly life. For the greater part of Father Hughes' incumbency, the parish of Granum included the municipalities of Hantsport, St. Anthony and Nanton, and a large territory on both sides of the C. P. R. line from Calgary to Macleod. A man of quiet and humble disposition, he succeeded by his painstaking efforts in the many difficult situations which fell to his lot while in charge of the parish. His flock he won the sincere respect, esteem and affection of everyone of his parishioners by his kindly love of friendship. In 1933 the missions of Hantsport and Nanton were erected as a separate parish with a resident priest, Father Hughes retaining as pastor of Granum and Clarendon.

In the autumn of 1936, Father Hughes suffered an illness which necessitated a major operation at Holy Cross Hospital, Calgary. Following this illness, he returned to his native Prince Edward Island to recuperate. Recovery was slow and in March, 1939, he entered the hospital in Montreal in which he died last Wednesday.

Funeral

Father Hughes' remains were taken to Tracadie, P. E. I., where they will be held, Oct. Monday, Sept. 23, in St. Mary's Cathedral, Calgary. Pontifical Requiem Mass was sung by His Lordship Bishop of St. Albert, Rev. J. S. Smith, assistant pastor; Rev. A. Rouleau, deacon; Rev. P. O'Brien, subdeacon; Rev. E. Doris and Rev. Capt. J. THE VERY REV. THOS. E. CULLEN
