## CAN. CLASSIC DEMPSEY PROMISES REAL RACE REFUSES BIG OFFER

TORONTO, Ont., May 14—(C. P.)—No matter who will win the King's Plate this year, one thing is certain—it will be a real race. The Canadian turf classic, the oldest continuously-run race on the American Continent, will feature the opening day of the brilliant meeting at old Woodbine Park, home of the Ontario Jockey Club, on May 18, and also of the Canadian turf season. The race is over the mile and a quarter distance with \$15,000 added to the King's 50 guineas.

Last year the race turned out to be an individual triumph for the Seagram star, Young Kitty, who the year before had been undisputed Canadian two-year-old champion. This month the story is different. Half a dozen thoroughbreds are real contenders and another half dozen cannot be left out of the reckoning. Fifty-eight were named in the entries for the 1929 renewal, and it is possible the field will set a new record.

Gathering added prestige as the years roll by, the King's Plate has reached pre-eminence in the dominion similar to the Derby at Epsom and the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs, which incidentally will also be run on May 18. It is limited to provincially bred three and four-year-olds, and the four-year-olds, are those who have not won a race as three-year-olds.

King's Plate day will see a distinguished gathering at the beautiful track in the east end of Toronto. Its emerald infield and the sparkling waters of Lake Ontario offer a spectacle of natural beauty to the crowds that will throng its two great stands. Many other rich prizes are offered during the week and handicap races in particular have attracted some of the best horses in America competing in this class. Steeplechasing also is at its best at Woodbine, the O. J. C. having always given particular encouragement to this thrilling sport.

The leading contenders in the King's Plate on their workouts in the past few weeks are the Seagram star, Circulet, who has been training in company with Young Kitty; Irish Sphere, another Seagramite; Shoreline and Pinwheel from the Thorns-cliffe Stable; Assal; Mrs. E. Giamco's Daisy Fair; R. W. Cowie's Master Bobbie; Milestone and Cuddle Doon. And this does not exhaust the list of possible winners.

Pin Wheel and Circulet, at a rough estimation, appear the "ones to beat." Circulet was undefeated as a two-year-old until he broke down in the Clarendon Plate in the fall, and Pin Wheel won the closing juvenile home-bred stakes. Pin Wheel was the first horse to beat Circulet.

Given fair weather a record crowd may see the race and the conferring of the laurel wreath on the shoulders of the victorious thoroughbred.

## Harness Training Season Advanced

BOSTON, May 14—A mile in 2:16 by Allan Wilson's pacer Pax Volo over the half-mile track at Windsor, Conn., last week tells that this is a very forward season for training and also is proof that the southern-wintered horses are not now much advanced in their preparation for the coming campaign over those which remained in the North.

That Ted Bunch has not especially hurried Pax Volo is shown by the fact that the same day he trained the two-year-old pacer Miss Direct in 2:18 and the three-year-old Tartan Maid in 2:16 1/4.

The performance of Miss Direct is noteworthy, for it is perhaps the fastest early May mile to the credit of a two-year-old pacer over a New England twice-around.

All winter the regulars at Windsor had much in praise to say of the daughter of Braden Direct, 2:01 1/4, which Allan Wilson bought at the New York auction.

Harry Brusie was most enthusiastic and told Wilson in mid-February that she would pace in 2:20 inside six weeks. The filly goes free-limbed, with the exception of a pair of quarter boots, is gated to order and has the best of manners.

Ted has not beaten 2:20 with either Jeannette Royal or Luke Bell. Both are training to suit and the Maine trotter now looks sure bet to start in the \$25,000 purse at Toledo.

The Crozier and Hodson horses are back at Charter Oak after ten weeks at Harrington, Del., well along in their preparation. Hodson has been around 2:12 with his pacing tops, Bert Abbe and Widow Grattan, and in 2:13 1/2 with the trotter, Holywood Pat. Crozier, too, has been right at 2:12 with the pacers Silver Weather and Volo Rico.

Topfield is an ideal training ground and it is not difficult to believe that it will soon become the most popular in New England. There are around 50 horses quartered there at present, all sound, and judging from the conversation heard along the rail, everyone working to please the owner.

Walter Gibbons, resident trainer, and responsible for the nice condition of the track, has 18 head; Jack Kingsley, nine; Townsend, Ackerman, 10; A. W. Walker, four; George W. Finley, five; W. T. Taylor, three, and James L. Grady, one.

If it wasn't for the fact that Jake Schaefer sometimes becomes slightly erratic in his play on the green tables, the business of having billiard tilts might have, by this time, frayed his nerves to such an extent that he would have ground the balls into fine dust under his heel and split his cues over his knee.

Young Jake, the son of the man who for years has been referred to as the Wizard, has been onesteping around a billiard table ever since he was able to climb up on a chair to make his shots. While he hasn't always been successful in grabbing off the big titles since he first crashed

the billiard world, he has kept his name pretty prominent in the public prints and has succeeded in losing just often enough so the winning wouldn't get too monotonous.

The younger Schaefer is erratic. While he customarily performs like the champion which he is, there are times spotted through his career when he has looked like a dub. He is not nearly so consistent a player as his father was back in the days when old Jake was riding the tables and making early billiard history.

And while young Jake may appear nervous to the customers at a big billiard tournament, he isn't always as cool and collected as he looks. He is just clever at masquerading and

is able to hide his true feelings from the gallery.

Whereas in the past a billiard champ was kept fairly busy defending his title, a new ruling by the billiard powers makes the champ a champ for a period of twelve months. Schaefer won the title last Winter and is the first champion to be affected by the new ruling.

But young Jake will be kept busy shooting exhibition matches and consequently will be able to keep up his yearly average of distance traveled around billiard tables. He figures that he has circled the globe several times just galloping around with a cue in his hand making more or less difficult shots.

## Major Aubrey Sold To Glace Bay Interests

### Crack Island Free-For-Aller Will Race On Cape Breton Tracks This Summer—\$2,000 Said To Be Price Paid.

GLACE BAY, May 15—Not to be outdone by the other Cape Breton towns, the town of Dominion has purchased a crack free-for-all race horse and according to the news brought here yesterday by the noted Dominion sportsman Billy "Boss" Wilson, he purchased the sensation of the Maritime tracks in 1928, Major Aubrey, 2:11, from Messrs McNeil and Buntain, Charlottetown, and this famous horse will represent the town of Dominion in the free-for-alls and the other classes he is eligible for the coming summer months. Major Aubrey is by Colonel Aubrey and he started unmarked last year. His parade through the classes he started in was one of the most sensational in the history of racing in the Maritimes.

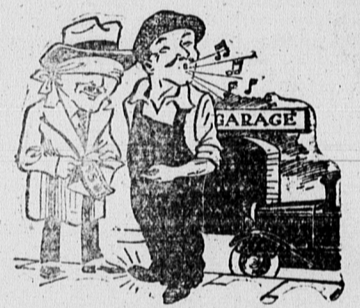
### GREAT RECORDS

At Charlottetown on August 24 last year Major Aubrey took his present mark of 2:11. This horse also broke a nine year old Maritime record when he lowered the mark made in 1919 by Lady Kip of 2:14 3/4. He held the record for being fastest new performer to be bred in Maritime Provinces. He also broke record of 2:16 1/4 made at Woodstock in 1922 by Crescendo for green Maritime bred geldings.

In all his races last year Major Aubrey was driven by one of his owners, Wellington McNeil, who is to be asked to come here to drive him on May 24th. Major Aubrey is a hopped pacer rather slightly built with a white nose and two white eyes which gives him a rather unusual appearance. Sensational as was his work on Maritime turf tracks last summer his performance over the ice paths last winter at Charlottetown was phenomenal. In races on ice Major Aubrey was credited with quarter in 28 flat and number of other quarters better than 30. Mr. Wilson, who bought Major Aubrey stated that he had bought him outright himself and that he would turn him over to Dominion Horsemen's Club as soon as the club was ready to take him. What he cost—\$1800, said to be the best sum ever paid for a horse bought in Cape Breton.
