JAPAN TAKES OVER KOREA.

TOKIO, Aug. 22.—Late editions of the newspapers, announce that under the Treaty of Portsmouth, Japan has today annexed Korea, thus adding a territory as large as England and fourteen million people to the Mikado's Empire.

Korea has been surnamed the "Hermit Nation." It is mainly a peninsula and figured to quite an extent in the late war. It has been noted for its exclusiveness. It became independent of China in 1895.

It also includes numerous islands in the Yellow Sea and Strait of Korea and the island of Quelpaert 50 miles south of the peninsula.

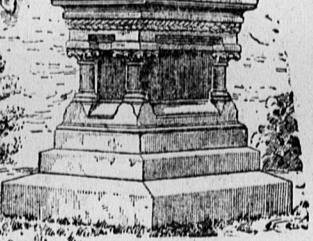

DEFENDS HOTELS ON P. E. ISLAND

E. L. Sibley, of Bennington, Vermont, who has been spending the past few weeks in this province, left last evening for Quebec.

Mr. Sibley, who is a native Vermonter, and a representative business man, took considerable interest in the recent letters in the columns of local newspapers in connection with the appointments in Island Hotels as found by a Vermonter, a native P. E. Islander.

When seen by The Guardian representative yesterday Mr. Sibley expressed in emphatic terms his pronounced disapproval of the statements contained in a letter which referred directly to P. E. Island hotel service, which ascribed their rates and accommodations as one cause of the dwindling of tourist traffic.

He said that he has been a travelling man for many years and was acquainted with a great number of hotels in cities throughout the United States and, on the occasion of his second trip to this province, has also become familiar with hotel conditions in Prince Edward Island. Therefore in offering his criticism on the remarks of a previous writer he was able to speak from actual experience gained in years of travelling.

Speaking of things as he found them here Mr. Sibley expressed himself as delighted with the hotel service and accommodations all over this province. During his stay here he stopped at different hotels and would mention the Bellevue Hotel in Tignish, the Mawley House in Summerside, the Seaview Hotel in Souris and the Victoria in Charlottetown. At all of these places he found everything neat, clean and well regulated with a cuisine that left nothing to be desired.

Especially good was the table service at the Seaview Hotel and at the Victoria Hotel where he was registered during his stay in this city. At the latter hotel which, he said, came in for such uncomplimentary, uncalled for and unfair remarks from the pen of the Vermonter, he was treated with every possible courtesy and attention.

He was given a room, clean, comfortable and airy and which was provided with all modern conveniences and the appointments throughout were up-to-date in every respect. The table service was of the best and was consistent with the moderate rates charged of which some reference was made by the native Islander.

That writer, he said, was unfair to the hotels and to Islanders when he compared hotels here to the Woodstock Inn, an hotel which was unique, in a class by itself, and which catered to a class with which hotels here have but little experience. The Woodstock Inn was open the year around and its secluded location was an attraction which had much to do with its popularity, while its management was peculiar to the Woodstock Inn alone.

He offered comparisons with the first-class hotels in many cities in the United States and stated that the Victoria compared most favourably with any of them in almost any respect, comfortable and luxuriantly furnished and fitted rooms, good and capable management, courteous officials, a table service that was almost unexcelled, and rates which were moderate and to which no one could offer the slightest objection.

He asked what would the writer expect to pay at the Equinox Hotel in Manchester, Vt. He quoted the

rates from personal knowledge and that would seriously alarm the author of the letter referred to, who was so indignant at the rates at the Victoria. With this hotel the Vermonter would stand close comparison. He referred jocularly to the previous writer who preferred "beds of downy ease" as a "feather bed tourist" and claimed the beds of the Victoria Hotel to be as comfortable as those of the best hotels in America taking his own, the same as in all rooms, as an example.

Mr. Sibley also referred to the Automobile Law which he commended from various standpoints. He did not consider the act did the province any harm. He was especially delighted with the splendid showing of the hay and grain crop this season. He had driven through various parts of the country and was impressed with the high state of cultivation observed on farms everywhere.

He intends building a summer cottage near Souris and sending a portion of each year in P. E. I. Mr. Sibley is evidently well pleased with the Garden Province and it is hoped that he may thoroughly enjoy his proposed annual outings to P. E. I.
