THE Stanley arrived from Picton at a quarter to nine last night. She brought over a number of Victoria Day excursionists who missed the boat on Thursday.

THE Fourth Regiment C. A. had a route march last night, headed by their band. The principal streets were paraded. The men looked well and marched admirably.

If a sufficient number hand in their names at once to the station agent at Vernon, a special train will be run from that point in connection with the Albani Concert, on Monday evening June 4th.

THE funeral of the late James H. Campbell will take place on Sunday at 2 p. m. from the home of his father, Alexander Campbell, Argyle Shore, Rev. D. McLean will officiate.

THERE were 15 passengers from East River ports by the S. S. City of London yesterday, and the following cargo: 500 bushels potatoes, 80 bales hay, 25 cases eggs and sundry other shipments for local dealers.

THE death of Richard Silliphant of Hunter River occurred early yesterday morning. Deceased was one of the oldest and most highly respected members of the community. Funeral takes place today at 2 p. m.

ON Wednesday morning the Supreme Court delivered judgment in the following cases: Liquidators of the Bank of Yorkmouth vs. Clow; rule absolute for new trial on ground that verdict was against evidence, the question whether the action was brought in the name of the proper persons to be disposed of by the trial judge on the new trial. In the case of Wheatley and Long, an appeal from a judgment of the City Court of the City of Charlottetown, the appeal was dismissed without costs on the ground that no appeal lies from a judgment of the City Court for the recovery of small debts. In the case of Rogers vs. Duvar, interpleader issue at the instance of the Sheriff of Prince County. The Plaintiff Rogers issued an execution against the defendant Duvar, under which the Sheriff seized certain goods, and took a bond for their forthcoming when required. He afterwards received notice that the goods seized were claimed by defendant's wife. The sheriff then applied for an interpleader order which was heard before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald at Chambers. As counsel for the execution plaintiff objected to such an order being granted, on the ground that the sheriff, having taken a bond for the forthcoming of the goods seized was not in possession of them and could not interplead. The objection was noted and reserved for the consideration of the full Court, and now came before it on the reference of Mr. Justice Fitzgerald. The Court overruled the objection, holding that notwithstanding the taking of the bond the goods continued from the time of their seizure in the possession of the sheriff, and that an interpleader order could issue. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald then gave his decision, substantiating the claim of the defendant's wife to all the goods under seizure, except one mowing machine, and granting the order asked for. Johnson for the sheriff of Prince County; McQuarrie K. C., for the claimant; Stewart K. C., and Tweedy, for the execution creditor. Court stands adjourned sine die.
