BANNER YEAR.

The Cherry Valley Dairying Co., held their annual meeting in the hall on Tuesday last. President Malcolm McLeod occupied the chair and in reviewing the work of the factory for the season of 1912 was glad to be able to report it as "the banner year." The old board of directors were re-elected and Edwin Doyle re-elected Secretary.

LOVELY FLORIDA.

Charles E. Ellsworth, writing from Jacksonville, Florida, in which city he recently arrived, says the weather is beautiful, just like July in Prince Edward Island, and that large numbers are crowding into Florida this winter. Over twenty thousand passed through the R. R. Station on Thursday, Jan. 9th. Oranges, he says, sell for one cent each but other food is very high.

BRIGHT OUTLOOK.

The annual meeting of the Hazelbrook Dairying Co., was held in the School House on Wednesday afternoon, the 15th inst. All the officers and directors, and a goodly number of shareholders were present. The meeting was most enthusiastic and optimistic in tone, showing the people's confidence in this, the best paying business (with the exception of black foxes), on the island. There were about 60,000 lbs. of cheese manufactured from June 1st to Nov. 2nd, and it only took 10.20 lbs milk to make 1 lb cheese. The average price realized for the cheese was 13.37c. per pound, and the net value of milk to the patrons was over \$1.00 per 100 lbs. The plant is in first class condition and the factory is free of debt. The old, tried and competent board of Directors and officers were re-elected. A. A. Moore was re-appointed Auditor for the company. A good suggestion of P. J. McKenna, Waterville, which was acted on, was the putting aside \$100.00 yearly as a sinking fund. Good speeches were made by J. B. Jones, Ludlow Jenkins, J. A. Moore and others on improving the stock, growing feed, etc., and sending all the milk possible to their own factory. A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the officers and directors for their efficient management of the dairy district, in order to further the dairy interest in the district.

GOOD WORK CONTINUES.

S. F. Tarbush has received a letter from S. H. Webb, Organizer for the National Grand Lodge of Canada I. O. G. T. who has been very successful in establishing in a few months on P. E. Island seventeen subordinate Lodges and one large and prosperous District Lodge, known as Queen's County District Lodge, and who was the recipient of a beautiful gold filled watch with charm bearing the emblem of the Order on the eve of his departure from the members of the Order in Lunenburg County, N. S., since leaving here and is now laboring in the good work in Quebec Province establishing Lodges there. He is at present on Gaspé Coast meeting with success wherever he goes.

GOOD LECTURE.

Colonel Bullard of the Salvation Army from London, England, delivered a thrilling and very interesting lecture on Japan (where he has spent some eight years as a missionary) in the Salvation Army Citadel Sunday afternoon. He was supported by F. J. Nash who presided as chairman and who also spoke very enthusiastically of the Army work, in general. The Colonel, who is a very eloquent speaker, held the attention of his hearers with his graphic description of the customs and characteristics of the people in the land of the rising sun. During his address the Colonel used many curious which he brought with him from Japan and which added greatly to the interest of his lecture. At the close of the lecture a vote of thanks was tendered by Mr. Turner and Col. Moore. Mr. Goff who was present also spoke eulogizing the Army.

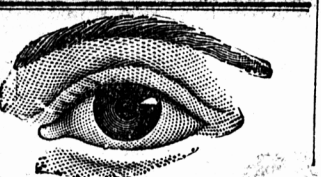

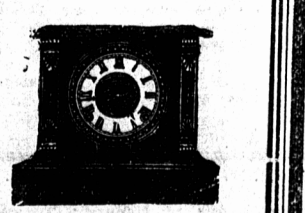
