C.A.H.A. Severs Relations With Parent Body

Owens Voted Outstanding U. S. Athlete

NEW YORK, Dec. 14—Jesse Owens' habit of setting the pace makes it no surprise that the tan thunderbolt was voted the outstanding athlete amateur or professional, of 1936.

Owens, winner of four Olympic gold medals and undisputed world sprint and broad jump champion, received almost three times the vote received by his nearest rival, Carl Hubbell, New York Giants' pitching ace and winner of the gold in 1933. Owens is the second negro to lead the poll. A year ago it was Joe Louis.

The Ohio State star, polled 177 points, while Hubbell received 68.

Larry Aurie Leads League In Scoring

MONTREAL, Dec. 14—Larry Aurie of Detroit Red Wings forged into the scoring leadership of the National Hockey League with a gain of five points during the past week, official statistics showed tonight.

Aurie has scored eight goals and helped out on six others for a point total of 14, thus displacing Americans' Sweeney Schirner at the top of the point column. Schirner was tied for second place with Herbie Lewis, Aurie's team mate, each having eight goals and four assists. Neil Colville of New York Rangers and Marty Barry of Detroit Red Wings were bracketed in third place with 11 points. Aurie, Lewis and Schirner have the greatest number of goals while Americans' Art Chapman, with 10 assists remains as the League's greatest "helper-outer."

Earl Seibert of Chicago, bad man of the League, boosted his penalty box time to 30 minutes.

Les Patrick Signs Nighbor

NEW YORK, Dec. 14—(CP)—Lester Patrick decided today Frank Nighbor was too good a man to be loose and signed up the Pembroke Ghost for his New York Ranger hockey family.

From Cowley Ed Wiseman Takes Lead

MONTREAL, Dec. 14—Eddie Wiseman, the Newcastle, N.B., boy who patrols the right wing for New York Americans, tops the list of former Marlitters in the National Hockey League's scoring statistics today.

Five goals and three assists have placed Wiseman one point up on Bill Cowley, the Boston Bruin centre who used to pivot the Halifax Wolverines' first line in their heyday. Cowley's seven points, though, put him on top of the former downcasters in the League's American division, while Wiseman heads the other section.

Just a point behind Cowley is his teammate Ray Gelliffe, one-time Charlottetown Abegweit, who has three goals and three assists. He and Cowley are even in goals, but the former Wolverine is one up on assists.

Hainsworth Replaces Cude In Nets

MONTREAL, Dec. 14—Will Cude, Canadian goalie, underwent a minor operation on his injured shoulder today and when the Habituants meet Detroit Red Wings tomorrow night, George Hainsworth, the veteran National Hockey League veteran will be in the Montreal nets again.

The former Maple Leaf replaced Cude Saturday against Maroons who left for New York with only two centres, Bob Gracie and Max Kaminsky. Paul Runge, another Maroon centre returned to New Haven in the International-American League and cannot come up to the majors for another two weeks according to league rules.

Russ Blinco, injured in the game against Chicago, suffered a six-stitch wound in his thigh but will be back with Maroons for Thursday night's game against Boston.

Two other Maroon cripples are by Wentworth who is to have his injured knee X-rayed tomorrow and centre Carl Voss, out for another week to recuperate from an injury contracted during the pre-season Maritime exhibition tour.

Maroons tilt with Rangers in their second meeting of the season. Maroons lost the first game 4-1. First place in both sections is at stake as Americans, one point below Canadiens in the Canadian section take on Bruins while a loss for Maroons would put Rangers one point ahead of the section-leading Detroiters should Canadiens win.

President Cecil Duncan Announces Withdrawal To Be Effective January 15

OTTAWA, Dec. 14—(CP)—President Cecil Duncan of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association announced tonight severance of "articles of alliance" between that body and the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

Duncan explained that as far as players on teams allied with the C. A. H. A. were concerned the step meant the only qualifications they would need hereafter to enable them to play would be certificates issued by the Hockey Association itself.

"The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, in accordance with the provisions of its articles of alliance with the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, has served notice upon the Union of the termination of the agreement effective Jan. 15, 1937. For some time the C. A. H. A. as a member of the Union has attempted without success to obtain the endorsement of certain proposals which it believes necessary and in accord with modern practices in sport.

"The Association has found also the Union to be ineffectual in the matter of endorsement of suspensions imposed by the C. A. H. A. The Association therefore believes that a continuation of the affiliation is neither advantageous nor desirable.

"Certain proposals with respect to the qualification of players in the Association were tentatively adopted by the C. A. H. A. at its annual meeting last spring. However, in consequence of the delay which has occurred in the consideration of these proposals by the Union and the further delay which was necessitated by the officers of the Association considering its position, actual competition is already far advanced in all branches for the 1936-37 season.

"It has therefore been deemed advisable that the adoption of these proposals should not be proceeded with during the course of the playing season, but will be deferred to final decision until the next annual meeting of the C. A. H. A. The Association's affiliation with the Union having ceased to exist, the whole question of the status of players may be then fully explored and provided for from the standpoint of the needs of hockey."

(This appears to be a reference to the fact that four points which came up for consideration at the annual meeting of the A. A. U. of C. a few weeks ago. These are the four points on which only the fourth could the C. A. H. A. and the A. A. U. agree:

- That professionals in one sport be considered amateurs in others.
- That amateurs be allowed compensation for "broken" time.
- That amateurs be allowed to capitalize on their hockey ability to obtain positions.
- That amateurs be allowed to compete against professionals without restriction.

The President, asked if he had anything to add to the official statement announcing the severance of alliance, had this to say:

"I would like to correct the impression which has been created by statements given out by Union officials that by severing its affiliation, the international alliances of the C. A. H. A. will be affected. This is absolutely untrue.

"The opinion may be held by some that the C. A. H. A. has had a binding affiliation with the Amateur Athletic Union since the inception of the hockey body. This is not correct. The Hockey Association has had a mutual understanding with the Amateur Athletic Union but it was only in 1931 that the hockey authorities were led into signing an alliance with an organization whose principal function seems to have been the selling of amateur cards.

"For 17 years from 1914 until 1931 the Hockey Association was not bothered with entangling alliances with the Amateur Athletic Union. During those years Canadian teams participated in Olympic Games without raising any international complications.

"In 1931 we walked into something by formally joining with the Amateur Athletic Union but fortunately those who were responsible for framing the articles of alliance had the foresight to provide that the agreement could be terminated on

Louis landed only one solid blow, a vicious left hook that struck Simms flush on the chin.

Simms fell backwards, his arms and legs in the air. Then he attempted to draw his legs under him and waited until the count of eight before attempting to get up. Simms was groggy and reeling as he regained his feet.

Arthur Donovan, of New York, the referee, waved the poker-faced Louis to his corner then wrapped his arms around the stunned Cleveland heavyweight, who apparently didn't know what struck him.

"All Star" Infield Of American League Named

CHICAGO, Dec. 14—The "all star" infielding quartet of the American League for 1936 was Zeke Bonura of Chicago, Charley Gehring and Billy Rogell of Detroit, and Red Rolfe of the world champion New York Yankees, the official averages affirmed today.

Bonura, generally regarded as a player whose slugging offset his lack of polish at field, confounded his critics by leading the first basemen in fielding with an average of .996. Also he participated in 150 doubleplays to tie the major league record set by Joe Kuhel of Washington in 1933, and topped the first sacker in assists with 107. He succeeded Johnny Fox of Boston as fielding leader.
