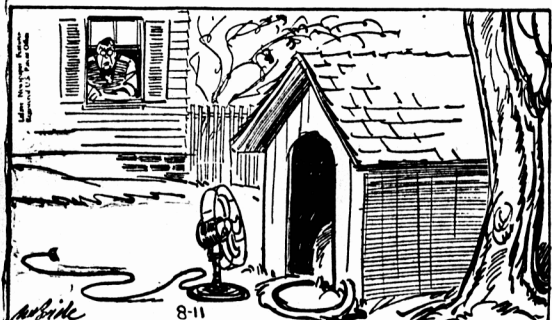
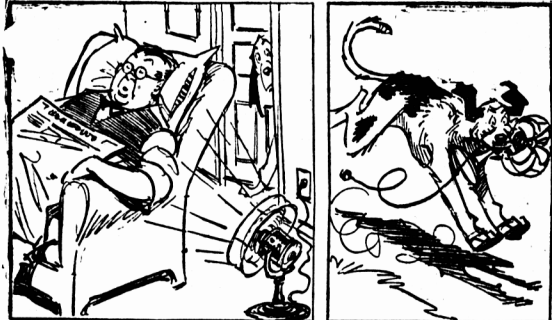

NEW MOTOR VEHICLE MARK TEST NEW AIRLINES

OTTAWA, Aug. 10 — (CP) — A new post-war peak in the manufacture and sale of Canadian-made motor vehicles was reported today by the Bureau of Statistics.

With June totals setting a new record for the month, vehicle shipments from Canadian factories for the first half of 1946 soared to 140,115 units, compared with 129,182 units in the same period last year, and with 128,215 units in 1947.
