MR. MORLEY ON INDIA.

John Morley, the distinguished English statesman and author, has recently delivered an address on India. and he treated the subject in such a way as to make many things, heretofore obscure, more easy to understand. Mr. Morley is usually classed by those who only know him superficially, as a Little Englander, but he really deserves no place in that category. It has become the fashion to class him as an anti-imperialist but at the same time to give him all credit due to a loyal and true Englishman. The reference made to the Government management of railways in India is interesting.

"It constructs railways and canals; it conducts irrigation operations; it conserves forests." At first the State railways were operated at a loss, and they continued to lose money for the first eight or ten years of their operation; but in 1890-1900 this loss turned to a modest gain of £270,000, and this had steadily mounted until 1905-6, when it topped £2,000,000. The figures for 1905-6 show a slight fall, but still it topped £1,000,000. This profit was made with an average charge for each passenger of less than half a cent a mile. The total financial result of State operation of industries, of which Mr. Morley says, "I make a present of it to my Socialist friends," is thus summed up by him:

The net charge this year for interest other than interest on railways and irrigation works is £800,000; so that you have the important fact that the railways and irrigation, after meeting all charges for working and interest, yielded a revenue of £3,102,000. That is to say, these receipts cover the interest on the ordinary debt about four times over. That is a very striking and remarkable fact.

Touching upon the world's comment upon Britain's methods of governing India Mr. Morley pronounces against the doctrine that universal suffrage is a universal right, that all men are competent to govern themselves without previous preparation in the art of self-government, that each community is to be left to carve out its own destiny without interference from any other community, and that the attempt by a highly civilized power like Great Britain to protect persons and property and lay the foundation of a future civilization in an imperfectly civilized country like India is condemnable despotism.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CENTENNIAL.

The centenary celebration recently held at Covehead, to commemorate the coming of the first Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Peter Gordon, to Prince Edward Island, furnished an occasion for the display of sentiments which do honor to the people of that congregation. It has been said by more than one of our local public speakers that, nowadays, the spirit of reverence is waning, and is noticeably lacking in many people of the present generation; but, judging from the earnestness of purpose shown in doing honor to the memories of their former pastors, the people of Covehead are manifestly not to be classed under this head.

A VERY GRAVE OFFENCE

A Trade Mark Which is Infringed by Many Dealers. (From Montreal Gazette, August 15, 1906.) The despatch from London, Eng., telling of the tailor who was sent to jail by a police magistrate for misrepresenting some tweed and infringing the Trade Mark Act, brings home the criminal conduct of retailers, who repeatedly deceive their customers. In this case it was found out that the tailor was advertising suits made to order from Harris tweed. He did not have a yard of Harris tweed in his store.

In Canada some dealers are lax in their morals in this respect. The Slater Shoe, which is the shining mark in the commercial world, is perhaps the favorite choice of the infringers.
