(Continued from page 4.) MR. McCOURT'S ADDRESS.

Mr. McCourt, Editor of the Watchman, spoke as follows:—

YOUR HONOR, MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—I think it would be unfair at this late hour to detain you with a speech. I simply appear here on the platform in response to Mr. Miller's kind invitation, as it would not be courteous to decline. I am delighted with the programme; I intended to take it in and enjoy it, which I have done. I have listened with great attention and with a great deal of pleasure and profit to the other speakers. I have also taken great pleasure in the musical part of the programme, especially the part of the last singer. She will be heard from again. I do not know who the young lady is. The others are well known here, and are always popular.

As regards the Charlottetown Business College my views on the subject are well known that it is not necessary to repeat them, as they might become threadbare. I would like to say one word here in regard to the Faculty of the college. You have heard what it has accomplished, and it reflects great credit upon the Principal and all concerned. As Mr. McCready has remarked, Mr. Miller is among those who have settled in our midst and have done a very great service to this province. For instance we would not have the Charlottetown Business College were it not for Mr. Miller who is a Nova Scotian. He is an honor to Nova Scotia, and a benefactor to this province. Looking at the number of young ladies and gentlemen whom he has sent out so well equipped for successful careers in life I do not think there is any man on the island who has done more for the province.

It is not fair, I think, for the Government of this country to allow an institution of this kind to live on its own merits. It is an important branch of education and I think that the least the Provincial Government

could do would be to give a public grant to this institution. I am not inspired to make this suggestion; I think it is only a matter of justice. Mr. Miller has accomplished so much in the past that with such assistance he would do even more in the future.

As regards Mr. Trainor, he has assisted in sending out young ladies and gentlemen, into the active world, into the practical world.

These young people are not like professional men, they are not obliged to hang out their shingles and wait for clients; the moment they graduate from the Charlottetown Business College they are ready for active and remunerative work which is waiting for them. In doing this work Mr. Trainor has accomplished a very great service. He is a young man of wonderful application. I do not know if many of his students could accomplish what he did. His heart and soul are set on this work, and I do not wonder at the success which has accompanied his efforts. He is one of our successful Islanders and a young man of high standing.

Now will say a word to the graduates. They probably do not appreciate highly enough the privilege which fate has enabled them to enjoy. They have a brighter future before them than a great many others. You know that a parent who takes a particular interest in his son or daughter is very anxious as to how they are going to start out. It is an old saying: "if a boy or girl begins well they will certainly end well". The poet says: "In the lexicon of youth, Which fate reserves for a bright future. There is no such word as fail".

If you take this lesson to heart and go out into the world determined to succeed you can scarcely fail; you will be the joy and delight of your parents and a benefit to this college and a source of satisfaction to your teachers. I have personal knowledge of the advantages, the very great advantages, which a business education confers upon a young man. The student who

graduates from Prince of Wales College first, and from this college, as he should do, has every chance of achieving success. All the graduates who succeed are conferring a great service upon Mr. Miller and this college, and when you go abroad, young ladies and gentlemen, you should never forget this.

I hope and trust in conclusion, Mr. Principal, that the people of this province fully appreciate the great services that this institution is rendering them, and that the Government will also show its appreciation in a tangible form. (Applause.)

I notice that the last number on the programme is God Save the King. I think we will first have Auld Lang Syne. I do not see how we could close this occasion without it. The large audience then arose and lustily sang Auld Lang Syne, after which God Save the King brought this the most successful term in the history of the Charlottetown Business College to a close.

The thanks of the college is due Misses M F Bradley, B M Gorman, and E B Byrne for the splendid stenographic and typewritten report which they made of the Commencement Exercises. Those young ladies are all graduates of the present term, and, so far have had but little experience in public reporting. We desire to compliment them on the accuracy of their work.

Principal Miller wishes to publicly thank Mr. A W Gaudet, one of the graduating students for his untiring efforts in the interests of the college during the term. Mr. Gaudet was chairman of the debating society, a prominent member of the college athletic teams, had full charge of the rink management and carried out the closing arrangements in the Philharmonic Hall—all of which responsible duties he performed with the utmost courtesy and satisfaction.
