# SCHOOL OF SCIENCE

## 176 Members Enrolled—Interest Increasing

### THE INDIAN RESERVE

#### Visited and Habits Of the Indians Commented Upon

Enrollment at Summer School has reached 176. The interest in the work continues unabated. Tuesday night's concert was a very enjoyable one. Miss Robinson's paper on Wednesday evening on "Suggestions as to the Study and Teaching of Shakespeare," was replete with helpful hints to the teacher or student of English Literature.

On Thursday evening R. R. McLeod, Esq., of Brookfield, lectured on "Evolution in Some of its Aspects." He gave definitions of the theory of evolution, quoting largely from writers on the subject and maintaining that the world's great thinkers from Aristotle down were evolutionists. He described the attitude of the leading scientific men of to-day as being favorable to the theory of evolution, and strongly advised all to accept the theory. He commented on the fact that evolution was not openly taught in our colleges and schools and showed that their was not anything to fear from the theory, that evolution did not mean that God was not the author of creation, but that it was a theory as to His way of working which differed from the earlier theories generally accepted but none the less accepted God as the creator and preserver of His creation. Dr. Andrews in moving the vote of thanks uttered a note of caution against the destructive tendencies that sometimes accompanied the teachings of evolutionists, that evolution properly understood was constructive not destructive. The motion was seconded by Dr. Bailey and fittingly presented by the chairman, Dr. Magee.

Dr. Reid of Middleton, commenced a series of talks on Hygiene, his subject was the hygienic house of the future. The lecture was illustrated by the model constructed by himself with great pains. The principal new feature was the regulation of heat, by which an even temperature could be maintained throughout the year. This, he maintained could be accomplished by verandahs extending around the house and heated from the outside. The doctor has exemplified his theory in his own dwelling where he says the temperature in the sitting rooms and bed rooms do not vary more than ten degrees in the year.

The members of the school who went on the geological tramp were rewarded by some valuable fossil finds.

Some of the schools procured teams and drove out to the Indian reserve, where there are upwards of 150 Indians, the most of whom have comfortable frame houses, enclosed fields, fruit trees and flowers cultivated. There is in the Reserve a school house, very neat and comfortable, church with its accompanying churchyard, the graves in which were exceedingly neatly kept and at the majority of which head-stones were placed, some of wood, some glass, some rough stone, and a few neatly finished granite ones.

## SOME FACTS ABOUT CHINA.

The following table gives the names of railway stations and their distances from Tien Tsin:

Tien Tsin itself is none too high above the water, and the land back of it is one stretch of morass, with a maze of lagoons and rivers—the Pei Ho, the Hun Mo, and the Chang Ho—combining in the marshes. The railroad runs for some distance east of the main body of the Pei Ho, but west of the branch used for navigation. Its last water crossing is at Peitang (meaning east of the Pei Ho.)

To make the marshes nearest the town passable bamboo trees have been brought from Japan and Formosa, and these have been driven into the grounds and then stone and earth filled in. From one end of the journey to the other there is not a stone as large as a man's head which belongs there naturally, and there are no trees or shrubs for shade.

There are two old forts in bends of the river, one of which has been blown up.

The other will be no serious obstacle. The journey by river is comparatively safe, as there are not many places where the Boxers can get to the river banks in any numbers, on account of the marshes. Near Lofa there is a good ford.

Pekin can be approached readily from any side after the allies get out of the marshes. The best side for a military attack is the west, where the fortifications are much older than in the east. There are many fortifications in the west end, near the International Club and the race course, which were outworks against the Tartars, and have not been strengthened since that time.

There are strong fortifications at Tunge-Chow, where an old fort, with a pagoda over 2,000 years old, has been fitted with big disappearing rifled cannon which command the country, the river, the Tunge-Chow wharves, and, at a range of ten miles, the imperial city.

There are rich fields and gardens about the city at this time of the year, but the great army of Boxers doubtless has taken all that was worth having for the support of an invading force.

There will be little danger from field artillery in the advance, for the country is such that the Chinese cannot work there any more than the allies.

### THE WEATHER.

WASHINGTON, August 7.—(Special).—Thunder storms, light to fresh south winds.

The remains of the late John W. Thompson, formerly of Thompson's Mills, and for nearly a year employed with the Dominion Steel Works, Sydney, were brought to the City last evening by the S. S. Princess and removed to the home of Thos. Dover, Stewart St. The unfortunate man died Monday morning as a result of injuries sustained while unloading timber from a vessel Saturday afternoon. Thompson was driving a team of horses at the time when a whiffle tree broke and striking him in the hands and stomach inflicted serious internal injuries as well as breaking his wrist. The funeral takes place to-day at 1 o'clock, from Mr. Thomas Dover's home, by carriages to Suffolk Cemetery. Much sympathy is expressed with the relatives on the sudden death of a young man who was only in his 21st year.

# A GRAVE OFFENCE

## For Which Two Canadians Receive Sentence

### HARRISMITH CAPTURED

#### Kruger Thinks of Surrender—Canadians Moving South—Another Death.

#### THE ROYAL CANADIANS MOVING.

OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—(Special).—Col. Otter cables that the Royal Canadian Regiment is moving to Wolverlock.

Sir Alfred Milner reports the death of J. D. Crane of Sarnia, at Johannesburg, of enteric fever.

#### TWO CANADIANS' SERIOUS OFFENCE.

The Militia Department announces Pearel and Hopkins of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Toronto, are sentenced to ten years each for collecting arms from the Boers and re-selling them.

Death is the maximum penalty for this offence.

#### HARRISMITH HAS SURRENDERED.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—(Special).—Harrismith surrendered Aug. 4th, to Gen. Mc Donald, thus opening a second line of railway communication between Pretoria and Natal.

Harrismith is the most important town in northeastern part of the Orange River Colony and commands Von Reenan's Pass in the Drakenberg range, hitherto occupied by the Boers.

#### CANADIANS NOW SOUTH OF THE VAAL.

Lord Kitchener with Brabant's Horse and the Canadians are south of the Vaal. The Boers attacked the garrison at Elands River, August 4th, and Gen. Carrington was sent to their relief.

#### KRUGER MEDITATES SURRENDER.

It is said Kruger is willing to surrender if given a satisfactory promise of his ultimate destination.

He fears being sent to St. Helena.

# ALLIES ADVANCE

## In Two Columns Both Sides of River

### A WARNING TO CHINA

#### Viceroy Paid a Reward for Major Waller's Head—Russian Cruelty.

#### NEWS OF SUNDAY'S FIGHT CONFIRMED.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—(Special).—The report is confirmed that sixteen thousand Allies attacked the Chinese at Peitsang on Sunday and forced them from their trenches.

The Chinese resisted stubbornly for seven hours.

#### HOW THE ALLIES ADVANCE.

The Allies are advancing in two columns on either bank of the Pei Ho River, the British, Americans and Japanese forming one column and the French and Russians the other.

#### 3,000 CHINESE KILLED BY RUSSIANS.

The Russians at Lassi Chow are said to have killed 3,000 Chinese.

At Pei Tsang the Japs, English and Americans fought one Chinese force and the Russians and French fought another.

#### RUSSIAN BRUTALITY A VICEROY'S RECEIPT.

Refugees confirm the stories of Russian brutality and of their looting everything in sight.

Among the papers of the Viceroy of Tien Tsin was found a receipt for 100 taels paid to Boxers for the head of Major Waller, an American.

#### BRITAIN GIVES CHINA WARNING.

Britain has notified China that her ministers will be held responsible if members of the foreign legations, or other foreigners in Peking suffer injury.
