Known only to themselves and a few others are the timely and generous donations that have helped the good work in this city in years past and down to the present hopeful time when the law is doing so much good. And money is still needed. Some cases require the attendance of legal counsel, to meet the counsel of the violators. No provision is made for this and the money must be raised by subscription or donation.

This is the centre of the temperance position in the great, good fight. Crimes of violence committed by Islanders have been alarmingly frequent of late. What is the matter? Almost within a single day we hear of one found guilty of the slaying of a Chinaman in Massachusetts, another beats his father to death at Glace Bay, Cape Breton, and a third, shoots his cousin at East Battery. All of these crimes were committed by young men. There is something appalling in such a record.

A correspondent signing "Loyalist" takes exception to a remark of the Mayor to the City Council to the effect that if the militia are allowed to use the Park and "we do not take care the place would revert to King Edward." We fail to see anything disloyal or objectionable in such a remark. Nor yet do we see any danger from allowing the camp to be held on the Park with consent of the City Council. But if the city were to permit, say a circus, or other entertainment distinctly prohibited by the writter and yet unrepented Act conveying the Park lands to the city, to be held there, the possession might be endangered and possibly forfeited. It is well to act with caution in these matters.

We greatly regret the drowning in British Columbia of W. D. Ross, B. A. a young lawyer of bright promise. He was engaged to be married shortly to an estimable young lady of this city. The circumstances call forth the deep sympathy of all for the loved ones so suddenly and sadly bereaved.

Nova Scotia, which has all along received the lion's share of the fishery bounties is well content for the Dominion to retain the fishery award, and would not join in the proposed arbitration. So now, as Premier Peters tells The Patriot, the matter is to be referred to the Privy Council, to decide whether the Dominion is bound in equity and good conscience to pay over the award. Should the decision be in favor of the Province, then the money will be apportioned between them by arbitration. An early reference to the Privy Council is promised.
