Made Upon Port Arthur on Wednesday Night

General Engagement Expected in the North with Kuropatkin—Staff Appointments.

LAND AND SEA ATTACK AT NIGHT.

LONDON, June 23—(Special)—It is reported that the Japanese made a determined attack upon Port Arthur from land and sea June 22 during the night.

JAP COMMANDER IN CHIEF.

The Marquis Oyama, formerly Marshal and Chief of the General Staff has been appointed to the supreme command of the imperial armies in the field.

The new Chief of Staff will be Lieutenant-General Kodama.

BIG FIGHT EXPECTED SOON.

A general engagement between the Japanese and Russian troops is expected soon and may last several days.

KUROPATKIN WILL FIGHT.

The Russians are concentrating at Liao Yang with a view to interrupting the Japanese advance, which is being made by General Oku along the railway from the South and General Kuroki from the east and south east.

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC BILL

Passes Second Reading in Senate, Fifteen Majority

Cox Did not Vote—Borden Criticized by Followers—His Line on the Dundonald Case.

THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC.

OTTAWA, June 23—(Special)—The vote in the Senate on the second reading of the Transcontinental Railway Bill was taken at one o'clock this morning when Sir Mackenzie Bowell's amendment was voted down by 19 for and 34 against.

On the main motion the vote stood 34 for the bill and 20 against.

COX DID NOT VOTE.

Senator Cox refused to vote on the main motion.

Objection was also taken to Senator Gasson (P) who replied that he had no pecuniary interest in the Bill and did not expect to have any.

CRITICISING LEADER BORDEN.

There is considerable talk in political circles over R. L. Borden taking up the Dundonald matter and throwing down Col. Tisdale, ex-Minister of Militia, whose special work it is to look after this Department.

Borden's followers are complaining that he is monopolizing work of this kind.

THE LINE HE WILL TAKE.

It is expected that Mr. Borden's speech will be a condemnation of the Government for dismissing Lord Dundonald.
