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Bennett Breaks Conference Deadlock

CANADIAN EXCHANGES REFLECT BOOM ERA

CONFERENCE DECIDES TO CONTINUE

United Action By Bennett And Roosevelt

Energy Of Canadian Premier Wins Support Of Neville Chamberlain

LONDON, July 6—(Canadian Press Cable)—The World Economic Conference, on the verge of collapse early today, was saved from complete failure tonight by united action of Prime Minister R. B. Bennett of Canada and President Roosevelt of the United States.

Decision of the Conference Steering Committee this evening will permit the meeting to continue on a restricted agenda, from which all monetary and tariff questions were removed at insistence of France and the European gold-bloc.

A sudden switch in the American attitude, dictated in a telephone conversation between President and Secretary of State Cordell Hull, placed the United States firmly behind continuation and received immediate, vigorous support from Mr. Bennett.

The energy of Mr. Bennett's appeal in turn won over Neville Chamberlain, Britain's Chancellor of the Exchequer, who had been only lukewarm toward the idea of continuing under present circumstances. When the vote was taken France alone of the 12 nations represented on the Steering Committee, held out for adjournment.

Gains Chamberlain's Support

The gold group had regarded Mr. Chamberlain as leaning to their view, but the force of Mr. Bennett's argument, representing as it did the wishes of all the British Dominions, swung him quickly to their side.

The stand of Georges Bonnet, French Finance Minister and leader of the gold-bloc, was weakened in the final stages of debate by recalcitrance of other group members. In the end even Premier Hendrick Colijn of Holland, strong supporter of gold policy, voted in favor of continuing.

Future outlook of the Conference, however, was limited by French and gold-bloc insistence they will not participate in "any discussion of monetary questions."

As the delegates dispersed after an arduous day's struggle, varying interpretations were placed on the term "monetary questions" but a French spokesman told the Cana-

Quebec Unit To Undergo Training

MONCTON, N. B., July 6—Carloadings and revenues for the Atlantic region of the Canadian National Railways are showing an upward trend indicative of the improved economic conditions in the Maritime Provinces, according to regional officials here. There is an increase over the same period last year.

The unit is in command of Lieut. Col. Landry of Ottawa who will reach Halifax on the Ocean Limited tonight.

The unit consists of thirteen officers and 106 other ranks. About ninety percent of the men are students at Laval University, Quebec.

Canadian Flyer Battles Strong Winds In Flight

Captain Errol Boyd And Companion Successfully Complete One-Stop Flight From Haiti To Washington.

WASHINGTON, July 6—After hours of battling the tail end of a West Indian hurricane and bucking strong head winds up the Atlantic seaboard, Captain J. Errol Boyd, Toronto's trans-Atlantic birdman, late today landed the veteran monoplane Columbia at the Hoover Airport here.

When Captain Boyd, war time aviator and conqueror of the Atlantic in the same plane, brought his ship down for a perfect landing he completed a gruelling 22-hour-50-minute flight from Port Au Prince, Haiti.

Accompanied by Robert G. Lyon, former United States navy flyer, Captain Boyd left the Haitian capital yesterday at 6:23 p. m., intending to make the 1,650-mile trip to Washington in one hop.

What he described as the worst flying weather in his experience was encountered over Cuba and along the Florida coast forcing Boyd to break his journey at Savannah, Ga.

After refuelling there, the flyers continued to Washington, landing here at 5:02 p. m. They had flown an estimated total of 2,300 miles.

AIR ARMADA EXPECTS DELAY OF FEW DAYS

Balbo And 100 Italian Aviators Awaiting Improved Weather Conditions.

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, July 6—(A.P.)—General Italo Balbo and the 100 Italian aviators piloting an armada, of 24 seaplanes to the Century of Progress in Chicago by way of Eastern Canada, tonight awaited improved weather conditions for the next stage of their flight, to Cartwright, Labrador, 1,500 miles away.

The squadron reached here late yesterday after a 930 miles hop from Londonderry, Northern Ireland.

(A dispatch to the MacKay radio and commercial cable company in New York said General Balbo, the Italian Air Minister, expected a delay of "a few days" at Reykjavik due to unfavorable weather conditions.

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Mrs. MacIntosh Pleads Not Guilty

LUNEBURG, N. S., July 6—(C.P.)—Mrs. Lillian MacIntosh tonight awaited trial for her husband's murder. Magistrate C. W. Lane found today that evidence at her preliminary hearing linked the widow, although "by no means conclusively," with Harry D. MacIntosh's death on May 30. She was committed for trial at the October term of the Supreme Court in Bridgewater.

Mrs. MacIntosh appeared today to have recovered from the effects of knife wounds and poisoning which confined her to hospital for a week after the murder. She sat silently beside a Matron. She rose once to say, "not guilty," when the Magistrate asked if she had any statement to make.

After the hearing, she was taken to her home, where she has been a prisoner since leaving the hospital. The house has been converted into a temporary jail because of unsuitable accommodations at the Town Jail.

Tim Buck Is Found Guilty

KINGSTON, Ont., July 6—Tim Buck, former leader of the Communist party in Canada, was convicted today of unlawful assembly during the disturbances last October and was returned to his prison cell to await sentence on July 18. In convicting Buck, Judge G. E. De Roche said he could impose a maximum penalty of seven years but said he had no intention of doing so.

Abandons Arms Reduction Plan

WASHINGTON, July 6—(A.P.)—The United States Government today abandoned all plans for informal arms reduction negotiations until Autumn, convinced that nothing could be done in the meanwhile to reconcile the prevailing and persisting disagreements on this vexing question.

Fulfills Wager At Cost Of Life

HALIFAX, July 6—John Quinn, 60-year-old card worker, bet his fellow card-players today he'd win the next game or else turn a somersault. He lost the game and the party trooped out onto the verandah to watch him fulfill the wager.

The somersault was half completed when Quinn slumped suddenly sideways, unconscious. He was picked up and rushed to hospital. Physicians said he had a broken neck and was suffering almost complete paralysis. His condition is critical.

LINDBERGH TO VISIT HALIFAX

HALIFAX, July 6—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh will arrive here by plane tomorrow, according to instructions received today by a local oil company, which was asked to have fuel ready.

The noted aviator is expected to bring his seaplane down about noon at eastern passage. Later he will fly to Shediac, N. B., to meet the Italian Air Armada under General Italo Balbo, or he may fly to Cartwright to meet the trans-Atlantic planes there, later continuing his projected survey of the northern route.

GENERAL IMPROVED CONDITIONS

Enormous Gains Experienced in Stock Markets Since 1932.

BANK HOLIDAY

U. S. Inflationary Policy Has Psychological Effect On Can. Industries.

TORONTO, July 6—Swept forward in the flow of confidence which gained headway in March and continued almost unbroken through April and succeeding months to date, Canadian stock values today had reached the point where 80 representative issues were selling at figures which mean an increase in the quoted values of the capital of approximately \$1,136,000,000 since the close of 1932.

Concomitant with the enormous gain in the stock markets, the continued advances in the grain pits, general increases reported in employment, building, and commodity price levels, faster turnover of commodities on store shelves and much improved railway earnings.

Low At New Year

The close of December found stock trading at a low ebb with values almost at the 1932 lows. The new year opened with a continuation of the depressed feeling
