SEAPLANE REACHED MAGDALENES—Word was received at the Marine Office from Major Shearer yesterday of the safe arrival of the seaplane at Amherst Magdalen Islands. The plans, which owing to the fog was unable to reach its destination Monday, left Charlottetown yesterday morning at 10:50, arriving at Amherst, M. I. at 12:10. A course was followed along East River to Mt. Stewart and through to Savage Harbor. The Brant is being kept at Souris in readiness in the case of accident. An hour and three quarters is the normal flying time required and had word not been received in the course of four hours the Brant would proceed to look for the airman. It is expected that the seaplane will return to the Province from Amherst today.

It is merely the activity of an "Anti-Marrriage Society," which has been formed in County Tyrone by young people of both sexes who have set their faces sternly against the institution of marriage. The police have taken the matter in hand, and it is likely that legal proceedings will follow.

LONDON, August 28.—A boy named Ronald Dale, while fishing for dabs on Hastings pier, landed an octopus with an ordinary rod and line.

The fish struggled vigorously, and was only brought to the deck of the pier after a prolonged struggle.

When on the pier it caused much excitement by vigorously flapping its tentacles in all directions, and several times almost slipped back into the sea. It was eventually killed, and was found to measure from tip to tip of its tentacles 2 feet 6 inches.

It is believed that this is the first time an octopus has been landed with rod and line, and so close in shore. Some time ago a party of fishermen hooked an octopus, but on the occasion the fish got away.

CROP REPORT

GENERAL.
Harvesting is now in progress in the southern portions of the Prairie Provinces and should be general within a week. The weather conditions on the whole are favourable in Alberta; the yield should be above the average. In Saskatchewan results will not be as good as anticipated owing to damage by rust and sawfly. In Manitoba the wheat coming forward is of lower grade than last year. In Ontario threshing of fall wheat shows yield above average and quality good. Cold weather has retarded ripening of grain. In Quebec cutting of oats has begun, average yield. Potatoes a good crop. In New Brunswick hay yield is below average. Potatoes very promising. In Nova Scotia conditions are favourable for all crops. Bumper hay crop here and in Prince Edward Island. In British Columbia grain crop satisfactory. Okanagan apple crop 20 per cent last year. Details follow:—

PRAIRIE PROVINCES.
EDMONTON DISTRICT—Good ripening weather prevails. Grain very heavy and partly lodged. Slight hail damage some districts. Harvesting has commenced and will be general in a week. **CALGARY DISTRICT**—Weather ideal for ripening crops. Harvesting has commenced and will be general about the 27th, yield expected to be above average. **LETHBRIDGE DISTRICT**—Conditions continue favourable though wet weather has delayed cutting which is fairly general. Threshing will commence in a week. **SASKATOON DISTRICT**—Harvesting now fairly general, but wet weather in some parts is impeding operations. Rust has reduced yield, but damage not widely extended and good average crop anticipated. **REGINA DISTRICT**—Reports from the Southern section show patchy conditions, yields varying from heavy to 8 and 10 bushels of low grade. South, Central and Eastward portions unsatisfactory, with wide damage from rust and sawfly. South of C. P. R. main line yield not over average. Harvesting general. **WINNIPEG DISTRICT**—At least 25 per cent of harvesting completed under favourable conditions except in the North, where showers have caused delay. Wheat shipments coming forward, grade generally much lower than last year and yield shows wide variation.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.
Grain generally of good appearance, but ripening retarded by unseasonable weather and in some sections oats lodged by heavy rains and wind. In the Laurentian and Ottawa Valley districts cutting of oats commenced, average yield estimated. Roots late, but generally doing well. Good crop anticipated, especially potatoes. The apple crop will probably be light. Pastures are in fair condition.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.
The threshing of Fall wheat is

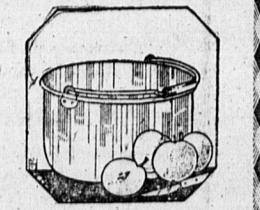

is now well under way, the yield is above the average and the quality good. Spring grains now being harvested. Corn has improved and a good crop is now assured. Fall and winter apples promise well. Roots are making good progress. Pasture lands are still dried up.
MARITIME PROVINCES.
In New Brunswick; St. John Valley hay crop below average. Potatoes are doing well and a good clean crop is looked for. In Northern districts hay and grass pasture are only fair. In the Eastern districts crops generally are good. Nova Scotia weather continues but wet weather in some parts is impeding operations. Rust has reduced yield, but damage not widely extended and good average crop anticipated. **REGINA DISTRICT**—Reports from the Southern section show patchy conditions, yields varying from heavy to 8 and 10 bushels of low grade. South, Central and Eastward portions unsatisfactory, with wide damage from rust and sawfly. South of C. P. R. main line yield not over average. Harvesting general. **WINNIPEG DISTRICT**—At least 25 per cent of harvesting completed under favourable conditions except in the North, where showers have caused delay. Wheat shipments coming forward, grade generally much lower than last year and yield shows wide variation.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA
Recent rains have benefited pasture and root crop. Grains a good crop, above average. In Nicola and Kamloops districts harvesting should be completed in 10 days. Owing to damage from hail and scab in certain sections estimated total crop of Okanagan apples now reduced, but is 20 per cent over last year. General condition above par. Pears, plums and prunes below average. Hops in every good condition. Northern British Columbia crops above average, except potatoes, which were damaged by early frost. Pasturage plentiful.

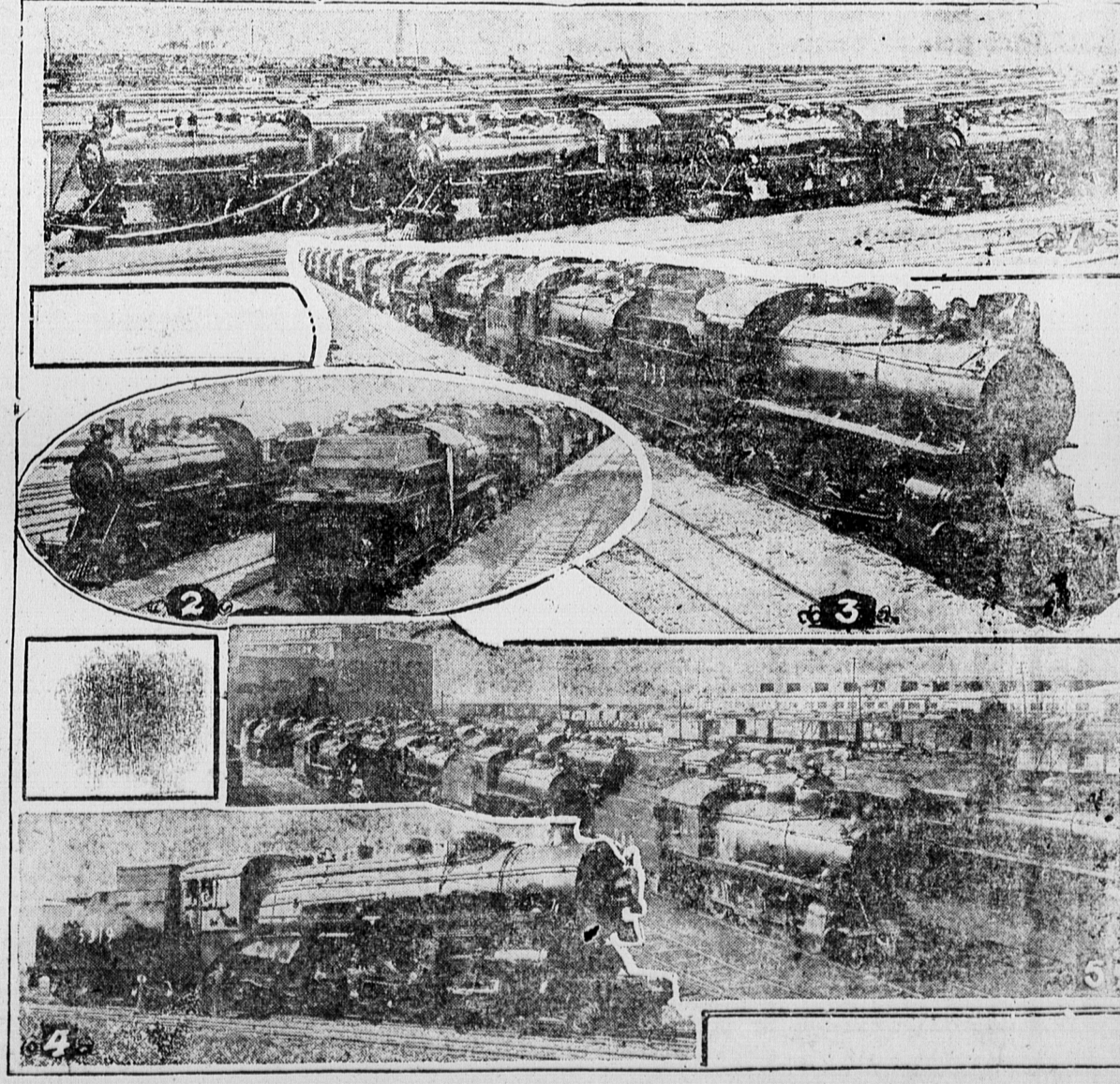

WURZBURG BEER MAY GO HIGHER

WURZBURG, Germany, Aug. 28.—Beer drinkers are watching the German hop crop anxiously. If the production this year is not great the price of beer probably will fall even higher than has been predicted by the brewers. An increase of 350 percent in paper mark prices is scheduled for the near future, and still more may be expected, as the efforts of the government to peg the exchange rate of the mark do not seem to be meeting with any permanent success.

Iron Horses Ready For Grain Rush
HERE are some of the engines and box cars, Canadian made for Canadian traffic, which arrived in Winnipeg recently to augment the rolling stock of the Canadian Pacific railway. This equipment is now in readiness for the transporting of western Canada's crop, which bids fair to be one of the largest ever recorded. These additional engines and cars were constructed at the company's shops at Angus, near Montreal, and have been assembled at the Weston shops, Winnipeg, awaiting the call to the harvest fields of the west.
The upper picture shows four trains leaving Weston with a string of approximately 100 box cars per engine. Each car has a capacity of 60 tons. (2) and (3) some of the new freight engines which will be used to haul the grain throughout the three prairie provinces. (4) One of the 55 new P-2 class engines. These engines have a total weight of 262 tons, exerting a traction effort of 55,000 pounds. Their driving wheels are 5 feet 3 inches in diameter cylinders 25 1/2 in. diameter by 32 in. stroke; the total length being 81 feet 4 1/2 inches. The tender has a water capacity of 8,000 gallons and 14 tons of coal, which is equal to the average citizen's winter supply of fuel. The engines are known as the P-2 class, numbered in 5,300 series. They have vestibule cabs for the comfort of the engine crew and are electrically equipped throughout. The complete weight of one train hauled by one of these engines, including the engine, is 4,478 tons, of which 3,020 tons would be the carrying capacity for wheat, or 100,660 bushels in each train, carrying capacity of the 45 engines of this standard is 4,329,700 bushels trip. Each engine makes one trip a day. Picture No. 5 shows another of the new Canadian Pacific locomotives. Their capacity and weight place them among the biggest of their type in the world.
