NEW ATTEMPT TO BREAK THE GERMAN LINE EXPECTED, SAYS BERLIN.

BERLIN, Dec. 12.—(via Sayville)—A correspondent of the Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, with the German army in France, is quoted by the Overseas News Agent as saying that now attempts to break through the German line must be expected.

"British officers who have been taken prisoner," says the correspondent, "have unanimously declared that the chief command will continue their attacks until they do break through. The French say that the conquest of the line between Arras, Bapaume and Peronne before Christmas had been promised them and that a realization of this promise was a matter of honor with General Joffre."

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after entering homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on a tract of 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction, in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

GERMAN SOLDIER'S ARE WEARY OF WAR

Private Geo. W. Birt now in France in writing to his mother, Mrs. Wm. H. Birt, Covehead Road, says: "Scmewherc in France, Nov. 21, 1916.

Dear Mother:— Just a few lines to let you know I am well and hope this will find you all enjoying the best of health:

We are getting along very good here only it is awfully bad weather, a lot of rain and it makes the trenches awfully muddy.

We had a lively time on the night of the 12th. We took a trench from the Germans and we took and held it alright. It was taken and lost a half a dozen times, but we were the only Battalion that held it. We lost a few of our poor fellows but we only can expect that. We took quite a lot of prisoners. They are getting tired of war and all say they are beaten but if the head ones only thought that it might all be over soon. I only wish it was over so I could get back home.

The officer I worked for got wounded along side of me. I dressed his wound in a shell hole. There is nothing else here only holes everywhere.

I had to take him back and had the pleasure of having two Germans to take back with me.

Well mother I have not much news so wishing you all a Happy Xmas and New Year, will close with love and best wishes from your loving son,

SAYS GERMAN MASSES ON VERGE OF STARVING.

STERDAM, Dec. 12.— In the course of a discussion in the Prussian Diet on the question of an increase in the salaries of minor officials, the Socialist Deputy Stroebel, according to the Verwaerts, attacked those who were receiving great war profits, while the mass of the people were starving.

The Deputy quoted the case of minor railway officials who were not only on short incomes, but were suffering from hunger, their income not being sufficient to buy their allotted amount of food. The speaker concluded:

"We long for and hope for any peace meditation in the interest of the official State workers whose suffering are increasing the longer the war lasts."

Proclamation by the Lieut. Governor

Lord Lansdowne, President of The British Red Cross, has made an appeal to the Empire at large for a collection to be taken up in aid of the Society's funds, similar to that taken up last year on Trafalgar Day.

This appeal has the support of the Dominion Government and the Canadian Red Cross. It has been generously responded to in the other provinces and it devolves upon us to do our part. Under existing conditions no one can question the urgency of the need.

I therefore invite all persons interested and particularly those who took part in last year's collections to meet on Friday, the 15th inst., at the hour of 4 p. m., in the Assembly Room of the Provincial Building, for the purpose of arranging to take up such collection.
