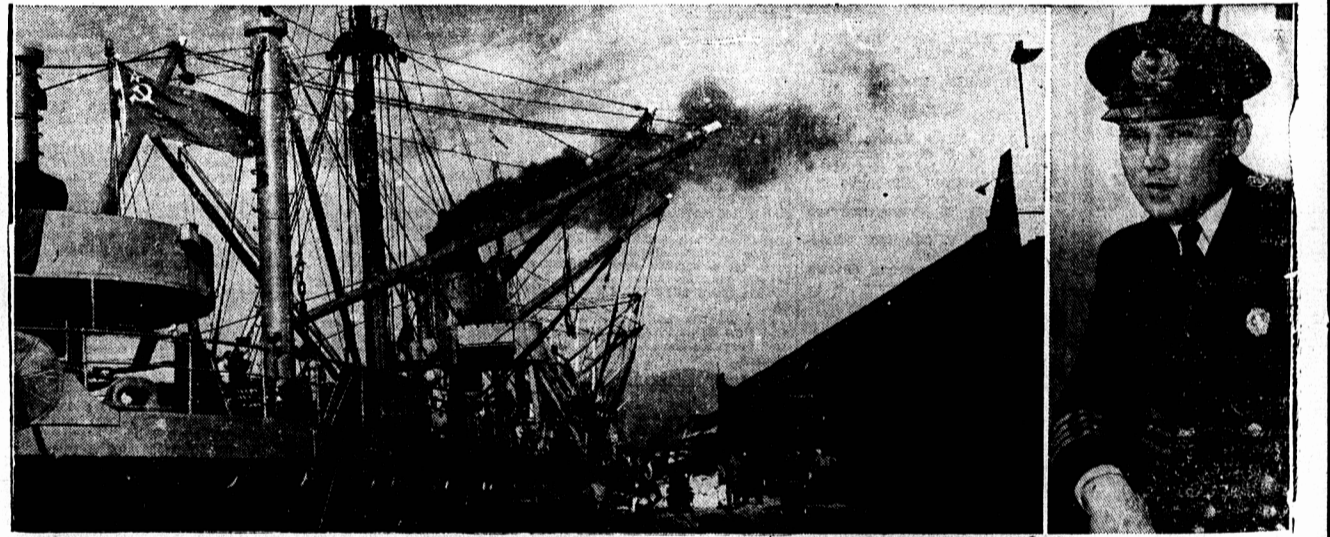

BRAVE DECISION ENDS IN DEATH

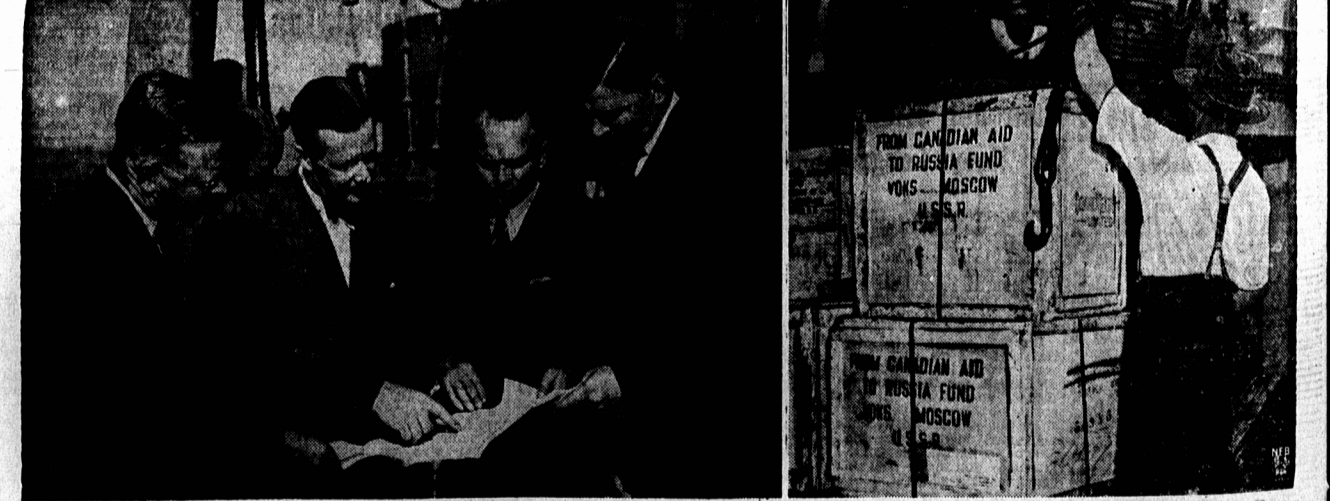
REDLINGFIELD, England, Nov. 22.—(CP)—Another United States heavy bomber crew chose death rather than endanger an English village.

In trouble over the thickly settled Suffolk county, the crew passed up an opportunity to bail out of their bomb-laden plane and took the lesser chance that they could jettison their bombs in an open field and make a crash landing. They succeeded only in holding the big bomber aloft until it passed over this little hamlet and then crashed in a nearby backyard, killing all the crew.
