Interpreting The War

The jaws of a steel-shod British trap are closing relentlessly in Libya on what is left of Fascist Italy's once powerful North African colonial army commanded by her fiercest desert fighter, Marshal Rodolfo Graziani.

With the fall of Tobruk to Britain's Army of the Nile, upward of 100,000 Fascist officers and men, including nearly a score of high ranking generals and an admiral and their staffs, are British prisoners of war. That is more than a third of Graziani's original force, estimated at 250,000 to 280,000 men.

It is not the full story of Italian disaster in Libya. Unestimated Italian battle casualties plus personnel wastage due to accident or illness must be included. Disintegration of shattered combat units further depletes the fighting effectiveness of what is left of the Italian Libyan army.

Probably Graziani has no more than 75,000 combat effective available now to stand off a new British westward surge. A large portion of his remaining army must be composed of work troops, service of supply units, not fighting organizations.

At Sidi Barrani, Bardia and Tobruk 11 of his front line divisions have already been captured or utterly shattered. The Italian "scuderi" stand at Bardia and Tobruk called for sacrifice of his best battle formations to slow down the British advance while the remnants of the army dug in on the Derna-Mekill defence line far behind them. A major aspect of the Italian offensive in North Africa was road building. Hundreds of miles of military roads, now aiding the British counter offensive, were constructed by the Fascist Libyan army in eastern Libya and, after the advance to Sidi Barrani, in Egypt.

That means that Graziani's army included an abnormal proportion of non-fighting troops, work troops, road laborers. Presumably the Derna-Mekill line is thinly held by combat troops, Italian or native, and by hastily extemporized battalions of work troops reorganized for battle service but poorly trained and equipped.

Their morale is certain to be far lower than that of selected men of the fighting line; and that did not prove notably high at Sidi Barrani, Bardia and Tobruk. On that score alone, the British army command is

respectively, at the end of the First Great War; Gen. Duncan Sayer MacInnes; Maj.-Gen. Henri A. Panetier, First Great War artillery commander; and Maj. Gen. W. A. Bishop, distinguished Canadian ace of the First Great War.

Among other outstanding R.M.C. graduates are Maj. W. H. P. Elkins, chief of Canada's Atlantic Command and Maj.-Gen. C. F. Constantine, commanding Military District No. 1, with headquarters in Toronto.

Of 1,336 cadets who graduated before the end of the First Great War, 982 served in that war and 147 were killed in action. Their records will be added to the R.M.C. honor roll, which has been undreamed of in the institution's first struggling days.

BRILLIANT ROLE OF R. C. M. C.

KINGSTON Ont., Jan. 21 (CP) — The decision to cancel until after the war the regular enrolment of cadets at Royal Military College has been temporarily suspended in favour of Canada's traditional educational institutions, but the story of R.M.C. always must rank prominently in Canadian military annals.

Among the honors offered to R.M.C. graduates last year after several were a number of commissions in the Imperial forces. From these awards as well as service in the Canadian overseas forces in the First Great War, have developed some of the British Army's most brilliant officers in various parts of the world.

As announced by the Department of National Defence Dec. 17, the graduating classes of 50 next June and 100 in June, 1942 will be the last for an unknown period. The cadets, dubbed "carpet knights" and "MacKenzie's pets" by an unadmiring public when the first class of 18 enrolled June 1, 1876, will make for intensive training of wartime officers of the Canadian army.

The R.M.C. buildings will house training quarters for senior officers company commanders and junior staff officers. The course for company commanders has been conducted since the first few months of the war and the other two courses—for senior and junior staff officers—will start next July.

NOTABLE ROSTER

The capacity of the school and training quarters never has been more than 200 since the institution was opened, but of that annual graduating class have come many prominent officers. Since a decade or so after its opening almost 65 years ago R.M.C. has been the Sandhurst and West Point of the Canadian army.

From the ranks of the R.M.C. cadets, chosen by examination from various provinces of Canada, by population as vacancies occurred, have come such men as Col. Sir Edward G. Galt, great military "blood" but in India and Egypt; Maj.-Gen. A. E. Cassatt, now commanding British troops in the Far East; Lt.-Gen. Sir George Cory, retired; Lt.-Gen. Sir George K. Kirkpatrick who commanded the British forces in China, 1920-21; Lt.-Gen. Sir A. C. Macdonell and Lt.-Gen. H. A. Bagnall, who commanded the 1st and 2nd Canadian Divisions,
