GRAND SCHEME OF GERMAN STRATEGY

BOULOGNE, Sept. 1. (By Gerald Morgan)—My American passports have enabled me to go in the wake of the German army invading France. American passports are of the greatest advantage because German officers everywhere show consideration for Americans. No correspondents are yet permitted by any headquarters staff and a correspondent who sought to put himself on the firing line would run a double risk, first of getting shot, and second, if he were not killed, but a second which perhaps would be serious to a war correspondent, namely, getting himself arrested and confined to a German fortress for the duration of the war. But I have been in close touch with the army and have seen constant fighting. I passed through many towns still burning from the French artillery fire and from punitive action of German invaders. I saw a German army enter Brussels accompanied in its great march towards Tournai. I followed close behind it to Mons across the French frontier. In equipment, physique, physical training and accoutrements, these soldiers are unsurpassed. The first line regular troops have been trained for years under physical endurance tests which have made the soldiers as hard as nails. I have seen them do thirty miles a day for several days in succession, every man carrying equipment weighing about ninety pounds. The army as a whole seems a triumph of organization. The attitude of German officers to their men is to the most severe, the least departure of rules of discipline being immediately followed by a volley of oaths, sometimes blows. Men who fell through sheer weariness were kicked forward by non-commissioned officers. The men were not backward but simply sudden. Through lack of sleep their muscles still responded to the call, but being insensible after incessant advance by forced marches, and frequent battles. It now seems to me these soldiers cannot possibly fight longer without a rest of at least eighteen hours. I have seen the French army, and the Japanese army, but the Germans seem more efficient. I passed between Bryne Leconte and Mons, a detachment of British prisoners being marched northward. I was not permitted to speak long with them, although I explained I only wished to send news of their whereabouts to their families. They were being humanely treated, except for the sarcastic attitude of German non-commissioned officers whose remarks made it extremely difficult to keep one's temper. The prisoners of war were having an easier time than the German soldiers. Upon the whole only their temper and self control were being sorely tried. They were on their way to a German military prison.
