SOUTHWEST, LOT 16, Jan. 21.—The annual meeting of the Lot 16 Dairying Association was held in the Hall on Jan. 12th, 1909. President Fulton Simpson in the chair. There was a large attendance of patrons and shareholders, who expressed their appreciation of the success of the year's work, it being the best in the history of the institution. A volume of business done, a fact which was very gratifying also the price received for milk was encouraging as this factory has been able to pay almost the uniform price of 95 cts. for cheese and \$1.00 for full butter for the past three seasons. ## NEW USES FOR AIRSHIPS ON LAND AND ON SEA

Although the airship has hitherto been almost entirely restricted to a move along at the rate of a few miles a day and there is enormous wastage of life long before the objective is reached.

An airship in half a day could cover a greater distance than many an expedition can travel in a month, and the moral effect of this great vessel suddenly hovering over some remote valley on the Indian frontier or some almost inaccessible place in the heart of Africa would be enormous. A few bombs hurled from the sky would strike a terror into the hearts of the natives, who would readily believe that vengeance from the heavens pursued them.

**TO DIRECT ARTILLERY.**  
In European warfare the airship will serve to direct artillery fire in a manner which will very considerably diminish the amount of useless destruction of non-combatants and property that ordinarily would result from long-distance artillery duels. Dirigible balloons will serve as scouting and observation stations, and aeroplanes by their greater speed and smaller bulk will also be able to carry out many a daring feat.

**REVOOLUTIONIZE WARFARE.**  
So much has been written of the military possibilities of the airship that I need not go fully into the matter here. Suffice it to say that in the opinion of many experts the aerial ship will revolutionize warfare. This will at first be effected not so much perhaps by the airship being a vessel of attack as by the new powers of observation which it gives. Warfare is based to a considerable extent on strategy, this being largely the art of deceiving an enemy and making secret moves. An airship gives such a commanding view in all directions that in the wars of the future no such secrecy can be maintained. The higher the vessel rises the greater is the range of vision of its crew, so that at a height of 4,000 feet a distance of more than forty miles can be swept by the glasses of the observers; and by the aid of wireless telegraphy and cameras fitted with telephoto or long-distance lenses they can rapidly report and record every movement of the enemy. Under conditions such as these strategic movements will hardly be possible save at night, and even then the powerful searchlights that can be carried by the airships will discover any secret move.

For destructive raids by land and sea, surprise and attacks on harbors, on naval and military bases, and lines of communication, the airship also has vast possibilities. To the British nation in particular it will be invaluable in those highly expensive frontier and punitive expeditions which are necessary from time to time in remote parts of the Empire. ## RAILWAY EMPLOYEES FORM ORGANIZATION

## RELAY RACE

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 19.—As a starter for the inter-class contest among the girls at the University of Chicago to get a mile of pennies for the new girls' gymnasium, the five contesting classes held a "penny relay race" in their Lexington gymnasium this afternoon. Each of the four contesting classes and the graduates who are also in the competition had a relay team of four young women, dressed in short skirted gymnasium suits. When Coach Stagg fired a pistol, five girls, each carrying a foot of pennies (16) loose in her hand, ran from one end of the gymnasium to the other and back again, jumping over chairs, tables and other obstacles and delivering the pennies to another member of her team, who repeated the performance. If the pennies were dropped the runner had to go back and pick them up. The cheering audience, composed entirely of girls, had paid an admission fee of "all their spare pennies." ## CANADA TO ISSUE SHORT TIME BONDS

MONTREAL, Jan. 21.—The Star's special correspondent in London cables: "I understand that the Bank of Montreal will issue this week \$25,000,000 of ten year 3-3-4 per cent bonds of the Dominion of Canada repayable at the option of the government in part or in whole on or after the first of July, 1914."

"The issue price is said to be 99 1-4 and the loan to be fully underwritten. It is said that the underwriting is being done today."

## BIG MINERAL DISCOVERY

PORT ARTHUR, Jan. 21.—John Fisher of Rossport recently discovered and laid bare a 25 foot seam of zinc, lead and gold, which has been traced for nearly a mile. When the snow goes a great many claims will be developed along the discovery. The discovery is about 7 miles north of the Zenith mine and was made quite accidentally. Extensive developing work is being carried on in Black Bay copper claims this winter. Michael McCormick of Sudbury secured an 80-acre coal claim near Rossport, which he will develop in the early spring. He has uncovered a promising 8 foot seam.

## NO RENT CAMPAIGN IN TIPPERARY, IRE.

DUBLIN, Jan. 21.—A serious "no rent" campaign has begun in Tipperary, owing to the refusal of the landlords of several estates to sell land to the tenants under the land purchase act of 1903. The judge, in issuing the decrees against thirty-six recalcitrant tenants, said, that the landlords were making a mistake in not selling land, as it would involve all the old troubles.
