GERMAN FOOD SUPPLY SHORT

TORONTO, Oct. 23.—The Mail and Empire publishes the following under New York date:—Despite the assurances of the German government that it is able to cope with all problems growing out of shortage of food supplies, neutral travellers returning from Germany declare that the food crisis in Germany is most serious and that while the Kaiser's armies are fighting the leading powers of Europe, the Germans at home are experiencing very bitter suffering as a result of the ever-increasing price of food products.

PROGRESS OF THE STRUGGLE FOR POSSESSION OF SERBIA

Bulgarians have Captured Important Junction on Route by which Allies' Troops for Serbia Would Travel. The Enemy's Road to Constantinople Dangerously Near Being Opened. Allies Landing Troops on Bulgaria Coast. Austro-Germans in North Have Begun More Vigorous Offensive and have Crossed Danube. Fighting in West Continues Without Much Change.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—The Bulgarians, according to their official report issued to-day, have reached Uskup, an important junction on the Saloniki-Nish railway, and have thus placed themselves across the route by which the Allies' reinforcements for Serbia would travel.

Other steps are being taken by the Allies to help their small partners. Additional troops are being landed at Saloniki and Bulgarian ports in the Aegean and Black Sea are being bombarded and it is believed men and munitions will be sent to Serbia by still another route.

The persistence with which the Germans attack in this region shows the importance they attach to capturing Dvinsk and Riga and the line of Dvina River before winter sets in.
