SCHOONER RACE ON OCTOBER 11th

GLoucester, Mass., Sept. 22.—The fishing schooner Henry Ford and Columbia of Gloucester, and the Gossoon, of Boston, will race off this port October 11, 12, and 13 for the championship of the United States fleet, the United States Race Committee decided at a meeting tonight. The dates were changed from 2, 4, and 5 in order to avoid conflicting interest with the world's series and to assure a larger crowd on the October 12 holiday.

Several trophies already have been donated for the race which also will constitute elimination trials for determining a United States contender in a possible resumption of the international races with Canada this fall.

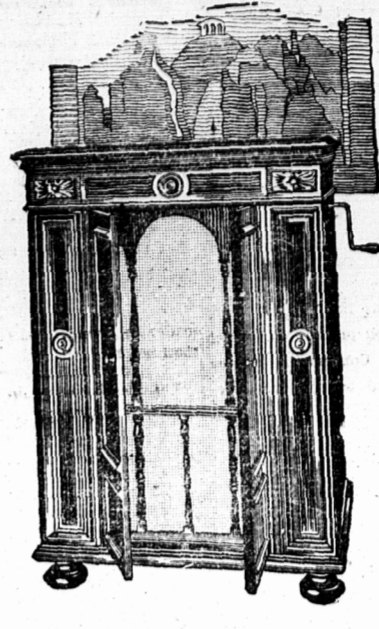
THE OLD GARDENER SAYS:

Geraniums which have been growing in the garden may be successfully carried through the winter by lifting them before the coming of frost, tying strings around the stalks just above the roots, and suspending them from nails driven into the ceiling beams. In the spring they will look as though they were dead, but when put into the ground and thoroughly watered, will soon start into growth. Small plants may be potted up and kept on a shelf near the cellar window, being given a very little water at intervals. Young geraniums are best for winter blooming but plants taken up from the garden and cut back hard will flower fairly well in early spring.

Fruit and vegetables which are picked in the early fall are more difficult to store than those which are harvested later when the air is cooler. In sections where frosty nights come early it is a good plan to open all the doors and windows at night, keeping them closed during the day. If this plan is not possible, good results may be obtained by mixing broken ice and salt in tubs, or boxes in quantities depending upon the size of the room or cellar. A few hundred pounds of ice and a few quarts of salt will cool a large fruit room or vegetable cellar very quickly.
