Mr. Henley had been a close second in 2:12 the previous year and when taken to the track in the Spring could turn a terrific brand of whiz.

Squires Bros. annual Spring celebration horse sale takes place next Thursday in the horse show arena building, Springfield. Quite a number of champion trotters and pacers are consigned and it would be a splendid opportunity for Maritimers to add a worthy campaigner to their stables for the coming year.

The 50,000 mark (\$12,500) Greater Jubilee prize will be raced at the Mariendorf track near Berlin, Germany, August 14th. The race will be run over a distance of 1 1/2 miles. Thirteen are ex-American trotters and 40 are German home-breds. Among the ex-Americans are Tara (4) 2,000, Columbus (5) 2,021, Joy Lancelotti (2) 2,014, De Sota (3) 2,024, Twilight Song (3) 2,014, Muscletone (3) 2,02, Vitamine (3) 2,000 and Calumet Builder (3) 2,024.

Tommy Murphy, who retired from the harness racing game almost ten years ago, marked more performers in two minutes with his horse, Vic Fleming, comes next with eight, while Dr. Parrish, Sep Palin and Tommy Berry are tied for third honors each with six.

No less than six three-year-old trotters have beaten two minutes, the fastest being Dean Hanover, 1:58 1/2. Seven four-year-old trotters have beaten two minutes or better, the fastest being Guy McKinney 1:58 1/2. Five five-year-old trotters have beaten two minutes or better, the fastest being the world's champion trotter Greyhound, 1:56. Four six-year-old trotters have beaten two minutes, among them the former world's champion Peter Manning 1:56 1/2. Three seven-year-old trotters have beaten two minutes or better, the fastest being Nedda 1:58 1/2, and one of the trio, Lee Hanover 2:00, the fastest trotter ever bred in Canada.

There is only one eight-year-old trotter that has negotiated the two-minute list and that is the immortal Uhlan 1:58, who for many years held the world's championship.

Buddy Baer Defeated In Fistic Upset

NEW YORK, March 4—Gunnar Barlund, ring-scarred Finnish heavyweight, sprang a fistic upset tonight by stopping Jacob Harry (Buddy) Baer, Jr., giant brother of Max, in the seventh round of a 10 round match, the main bout at Madison Square Garden.

Referee Billy Cavanagh halted the bout in 1:35 of the seventh as Baer hung on the ropes in his own corner, and awarded a technical knockout victory to Barlund. The outcome not only surprised a gathering of 9,565 cash customers, who paid \$23,102.34, but shocked the betting fraternity which had made Baer a 5 to 12 choice to win and 5 to 6 favorite to win by a knockout.

Baer called it quits after taking a patting for five of the first six rounds. He was not once knocked off his feet, though he slipped and went to his knees once, in the sixth round, but Buddy turned appealingly to his corner and then the fight was just before the bout came to a sudden ending.

"I've had enough," Baer mumbled to Cavanagh as the referee started to pry the pair apart. Baer, in his corner, was on the receiving end of a two-handed shellacking and bleeding freely from the nose and mouth. His legs dangled at his side. His huge shoulders slumped, and he gave every appearance of being thoroughly discouraged.

In the midst of the furor caused by Barlund's decisive victory, one of the Finn's handlers, Al Ramo, fell to the ring floor in a faint. He was quickly revived but twisted one knee and had to be carried from the ring.

The sturdy Finn spotted his rival 42 pounds, scaling only 200 1-4 to Buddy's 242 1-2, but his superior punching and superior generalship more than offset Baer's physical advantages.
