Recovery Trend On N. Y. Stock Exchange; Golds Dip At Toronto

NEW YORK, Nov. 23—(AP)—A late recovery chopped down earlier losses in today's market but most stocks closed lower.
Final prices were off fractions to a point or so and above the day's lows in numerous cases.
Turnover of 1,010,000 shares compared with 890,000 Monday.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined .1 of one point to 64.5.
One of the liveliest issues in the market, American Broadcasting Co. slipped 1-8 to 9 after hitting a new high for the year yesterday.

At Toronto
TORONTO, Nov. 23—(CP)—Golds dipped more than a point today to the lowest figure on the Toronto Stock Exchange since Feb. 1943. Base metals were also down in active trading and western oils steadied slightly towards the close after being weak most of the session.
Seniors started the downward march in golds as Dome and Lake Shore sold at lows in early trading. They firmed in afternoon trading but the junior list dropped steadily with 14 issues setting lows. Losses ranged up to 10 cents and were scattered throughout a wide list of junior producers.

At Montreal
MONTREAL, Nov. 23—(CP)—Selected industrials failed to establish any definite trend during light trading on the Montreal Stock Exchange and Curb Market today. A brief rally near the close of trading enabled gains to get on an equal footing with losses. Eight issues had turnovers exceeding 1,000 shares each.
Mines moved into easier ground as trading was quiet.
Industrial sales were approximately the same as the previous day's with a turnover of 46,000 shares. Mines totalled 186,300 shares, an increase of 9,200 shares over yesterday.
Closing averages had banks up .03 at 27.86; utilities unchanged at 74.5; industrials off .5 at 130.5; papers up 1.81 at 343.86 and golds off .45 at 58.81.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 23—(CP)—Fairly aggressive demand appeared in oats futures on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today for American interests and shippers. Barley was taken by shippers and processors.
Rye was offered down by commission houses and saw occasional buying by shippers. The deferred months of flax came in for trading stimulated by reports of new business in this coarse grain.
There was no allocation of wheat to the United Kingdom but it was reported a fair quantity of Canadian wheat had been sold in the last few days to an European country.

MONTREAL, Nov. 23—(CP)—There were 361 cattle, 21 sheep and lambs, 119 hogs and 127 cattle for sale on the two Montreal Livestock Markets today.
Trading on cattle was slow and prices were steady. Medium cows ranged from 13-15 and common butchers 11.50-13. Canners and cutters made 9-11. Common bulls were 11-15.
Calves were firm at 28. Common first grade ranged from 23-27. Grassers were 14-16.
Lambs sold from 23-24 according to quality. Sheep were 5-10.
Hogs were selling at 31.50 for grade A with sows at 27 dressed.

RATS DESTROY FOOD AND MENACE HEALTH

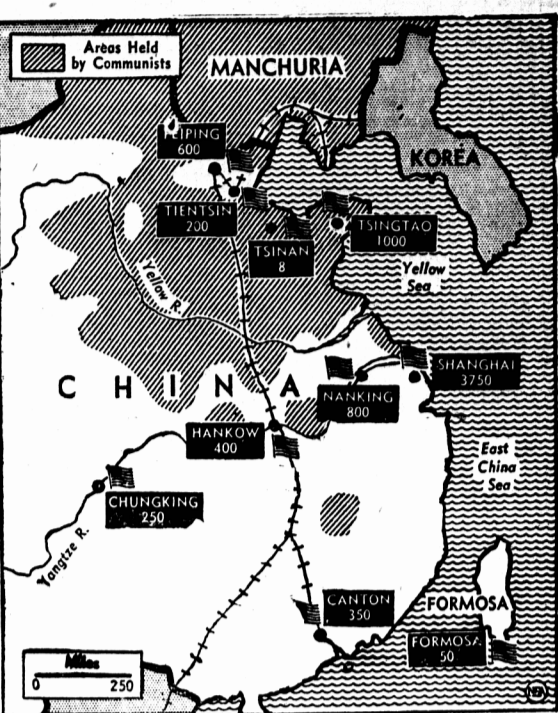
Among the things that nobody knows, is how many rats there are in the world. But it has often been assumed that the number is at least equal to the human population. Canada has a population of 10 million, which means there are probably a similar number of these rodents acting as destroyers of food and property, and presenting a serious problem to public health authorities across the Dominion.
The common brown or Norway rat in addition to being a prolific breeder probably eats, as an adult, about an ounce of food a day. While it is true that rats eat much that is unfit for human use, they also eat practically anything used as food by human beings and by livestock, except hay.
They also contaminate food and make it unfit for human consumption with consequent loss to producers.
The extermination of rats is complicated by the fact that most of the suitable poison baits used in their destruction are also injurious to other animals and to humans. If reasonable precautions are observed, however, poison baits can be used to good effect.
One of the best methods of avoiding damage from rats is to rodent-proof buildings. Concrete is one of the best materials as foundations and around spaces where drain and other pipes lead out of a building. Doors should be bound at their base with sheet-metal, and ventilators and basement windows should be covered with wire-netting.
Traps are effective if there are not many rats, and if in a house where the use of poison bait would be undesirable. It is a good plan to cover the traps with a piece of cheesecloth or scatter sawdust around as this helps to make them less obvious.
