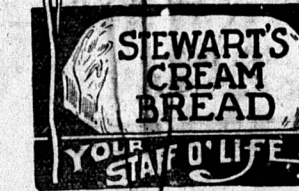

Before his entry into the Consular service he was a production engineer with the General Electric Company, 120 Broadway, New York City. He is a member of the Knights of Columbus, Military Order of Foreign Wars, American Legion, Brooklyn Club, Crescent Club of Brooklyn, American Consular Association of Washington, Garrison Club of Quebec and Halifax Gyrlo Club, and while in Charlottetown he recently was made a member of the Charlottetown Rotary Club. Like her husband Mrs. Giroux also saw service in France during the war, serving with the American Red Cross in St. Nazaire, Angers, Paris, Auteuil and Brest. She is a graduate of Erasmus Hall and Packer Institute of Brooklyn and Kings County Hospital, Brooklyn. She is a member of the female auxiliary of the American Legion, American Red Cross Nursing Units, Kings County Nursing Association, American Nurses' Association and the National Catholic Welfare Council.

Mr. Giroux will be relieved here by Mr. John C. Moomaw, now stationed in Montreal, Quebec. Mr. Moomaw will be given the usual royal welcome from Charlottetown in her customary manner.

U. S. BEST PRO. GOLFERS PLAN TO INVADE BRITAIN

NEW YORK, March 10.—Professional golfers of the United States are planning another attack on the royal and ancient heights of Great Britain this year in the hope of duplicating the triumphs they have scored in the past two years. Officials of the Professional Golfers' Association today said that no attempt would be made to recognize a team such as was sent over in 1921 under the captaincy of Emmet French of Youngstown, Ohio, but that several of the most prominent "pro" stars are likely to make the trip as individuals.

Gene Sarazen, United States open and professional titleholder, and Walter Hagen, present British open champion, are expected to lead the invaders in the British open championship at Troon, Scotland, June 11 to 15. In addition, there is a possibility that Jim Barnes, former United States champion, and John Black, the veteran, who finished only a stroke behind Sarazen at Skokie last summer, may join the party.

More Protests Against Sales Tax Imposition

OTTAWA, Ont., Mar. 13.—Representatives of a delegation from the union of Canadian municipalities in regard to the stamp tax on municipal tax receipts were listened to by Tariff Commissioner J. A. Russell and R. R. Ferrow, Deputy Minister of Customs this afternoon. The delegation asked that the regulations be amended so as to allow a more convenient method of paying the tax than by affixing stamps to municipal tax receipts.

The delegates were assured that their representations would receive every consideration.

King's Medal For Best Shot

OTTAWA, Ont., Mar. 13.—Information has been received by the Department of National Defence that acting on the suggestion of Marshal Earl Haig, president of the Army Relief Association, and former commander in chief of the British forces in the war, the King has approved of the reinstatement of the "King's Medal" to be awarded to the best shot in the army.

The scheme entails the grant of six medals, one each for the home army "British Isles," Canada, India, Australia, South Africa and New Zealand. The Department of National Defence has accepted the medal offered to Canada and it will be competed for annually among serving members of the active militia at the annual rifle meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association at Connaught Rifle Range at Ottawa.

NEW YORK, Mar. 13.—An epoch-making occurrence was reported in butter circles yesterday when a 522,000 pound cargo of creamery butter arrived from Auckland, N. Z.

New York market men announced that a fleet of butter carrying ships was now on the high seas with nearly ten million pounds of New Zealand butter destined for consumption in this country. Its arrival, it was predicted would send the price of creamery butter to consumers down to fifty cents a pound. The cargo came by way of the Panama Canal.

Latest Potato Prices in Maine

HOULTON, Me., Mar. 13.—Potatoes are bringing \$1.35 today. Providing cars could be obtained, dealers, so it is said, could pay the farmer at least \$1.65 per barrel.

Southern competition is of vital interest to potato growers who still had last year's crop. There follows the forecast of the U. S. Department of Agriculture that the early southern potato crop averaged 23 per cent below that of 1922 is good news, for there are heavy holdings of potatoes in the North. The estimated total 1922 acreage in the six potato producing states in the South was 190,379; the forecast for 1923 is 148,750 acres. The biggest stump took place in Florida plantings, which dropped from 28,240 acres to 19,768.

This should go a long way toward making 1923 a prosperous year for an important part of Maine's agriculture.

Reno's Divorce Colony Fooled by Dry Agents

RENO, Nev., Mar. 13.—Reno's divorce colony is gasping at the discovery that two of its most recent additions, who had become quite prominent among the gayer set, were dry enforcement officers whose activities had brought about thirteen arrests and the closing of several places.

One of the agents posed as a film company director and the other appeared in the role of "representative of the steel trust." They gained admittance to the select coterie by convincing attorneys that they sought divorces from fictitious women whose purported photographs and letters they displayed.

One of the attorneys was said to have introduced one of the agents to young women who enjoyed parties enlivened by beverages not compatible with the law.

1 cups flour
1 tablespoon butter or lard
1 egg
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon salt

Cream butter and sugar. Add egg well beaten. Mix and sift dry ingredients and add to the first mixture. Roll on a floured board. Cut with a doughnut cutter. Fry in very hot deep fat.
