An emergency meeting of the City Council was held Wednesday evening to pass a bill respecting the "Inspection of Buildings, &c." Mayor Rogers and all the councillors with the exception of Councillor Campbell were present. After a lengthy discussion the bill was passed. It provides for the appointment of an inspector who has power to condemn or cause to be removed any unsafe building within the city. It also requires fire escapes to be placed on hotels. It also provides that, in a certain section of the town no wooden buildings will be allowed to be constructed, and that all parties in future erecting new buildings or re-modelling old ones must receive a permit from the building inspector, at a cost of not more than \$90. The building of live-ry stables was prohibited in certain localities and very stringent regulations will be required in regard to their sanitary condition. Wednesday night the bill was given its second and third reading and went into effect yesterday. The details of the bill were very carefully considered in committee, with the result that we have now what is believed to be a very workable and necessary measure, which will tend towards the betterment of the city.

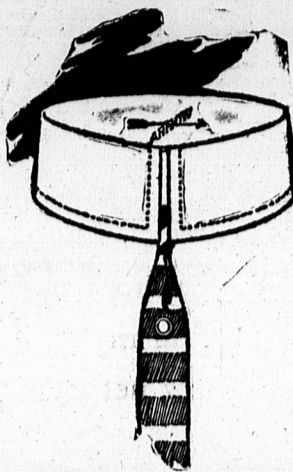
