—TRANSFERRED—After serving several years on the staff of the Bank of Nova Scotia in the Canadian West, Mr. Frank Pidgeon has again been transferred to the Summerside Branch, his friends and citizens in general warmly welcome him back. He takes the position vacated by Mr. C. E. Tanner, who has been transferred to the Fredericton Branch, N. B.

—WATER AND SEWERAGE REPORT—The final report of the Summerside Water and Sewerage Commissioners for the present term was held last night. The financial statement shows the revenue for 1920 to be \$3,491.70 and the ordinary expenditures \$6,979.42 leaving a deficit of \$3,487.72 to be paid to town. During the year 31,513,568 gallons of water were pumped, the average daily consumption was 86,388 gallons and 275 tons of coal were consumed, 359 residences, 76 stores, etc., and 10 stables were connected. The term of Commissioner Bishop is now expired.

Owing to the prevalence of whooping cough and measles the Borden School was closed on Monday last.

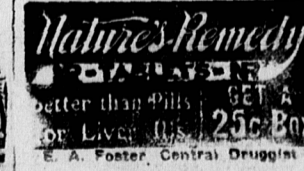
