A joint committee of the Provincial and Charlottetown Temperance Alliances, consisting of Rev. Messrs. Whiston and McConnell, John Anderson, J. D. Seaman, A. W. Sterne, J. K. Ross and D. Schurman, met the Government yesterday afternoon to confer on the matter of temperance legislation. Mr. Anderson submitted a resolution asking the Legislature to pass a law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes in the city of Charlottetown. Premier Farquharson did not seem to approve of limiting such a law to Charlottetown, but indicated that if the Alliances submitted a prohibitory law for the whole Province he would favor it and further that he would place the services of the Law Clerk or other counsel at the disposal of the Alliances. It is understood they have accepted the offer.

## King Oscar Anti Boer.

LONDON, May 2.—I am entirely on the British side in this war in South Africa, said the King of Sweden and Norway, now on a visit to this country, in an interview, recently. 'You may make it quite clear that I have no sympathy whatever with the Boers, and I will tell you why. I find it difficult to understand either the principles of a religion which is apparently a monopoly of the burghers of the two states, or of the political manifestations of a government which seems to have refused most of the reforms suggested by the British and which closed its negotiations by invading British territory.'

'In my opinion the English-speaking races are the exact opposite of the Boers, because they are among the best colonizers of the world when savage and uncivilized territory has to be reclaimed. No greater proof of this could have been given than the splendid outburst of loyalty at home, and the heroism in the field which every British colony has so unanimously displayed. This is the good which has come to Great Britain out of the evil which any war brings in its train, and that will be her compensation for the many disappointments she has suffered hitherto. 'You may make it quite clear that I have no sympathy whatever with the Boers, and that I will give no support to the attempts that they are making to secure the countenance or co-operation of our countries.'

## Dreifus in Paris.

PARIS, May 14.—Captain Alfred Dreifus left Geneva Sunday evening and arrived with his wife in Paris this morning. The Government is much worried by this journey, which was quite unlooked for, and will take measures to have him leave as soon as possible, owing to the fear of demonstrations.
