TELEPHONE communication between Summerside and Charlottetown was cut off all day yesterday, the result of Thursday night's storm.

The residence of B. H. Ramsay, Montrose, was burnt to the ground Thursday at 11 a. m. The fire originated from a defective flue. Mr. Ramsay was absent at the time and returned to find the house almost destroyed. Mrs. Ramsay and daughter who were in the house at the time escaped with difficulty uninjured. The loss is a heavy one. Very little of the furniture was saved, and the insurance was light.

John Hall, Sherbrook, had the misfortune to lose a valuable horse during Thursday night. Mr. Hall was driving home and when at Read's corner about eleven o'clock at night the horse got into a slough. After trying in vain to extricate the animal Mr. Hall called at a neighbor's and got the assistance of several men who worked until 5 o'clock next morning but were unable to save the animal which finally died from the effects of cold and exhaustion.

ONE of the severest electrical storms that has visited this part of the province for some years, and certainly the worst ever experienced here at this season of the year, occurred Thursday evening accompanied by a strong gale and quite a heavy downpour of rain. Slight flashes of lightning were visible shortly before eight o'clock, but the real storm set in about 8:30 when the lightning became extremely vivid and the thunder pealed forth at times louder than is usually heard here. Many buildings shook when some of the explosions took place, and some citizens who were in the streets during the worst part of the storm were for a few seconds dazed from the shock. The lightning struck the spire of St. Paul's R. C. Church near the top and ran down in snake-like course stripping the shingles about one foot in width down to the brick work, and also damaging some of the eave flashings. The lightning gradually ceased shortly before eleven o'clock, and about midnight the wind veered around to the westward followed by the dropping of the temperature considerably below freezing.
