S. S. Harland made her usual trips to and from West River on Saturday carrying fairly good freight each way and one hundred and twenty passengers of whom seventy were excursionists who made the round trip in the afternoon.

Dr H. D. Johnson and L. B. McMillan, City, President and Secretary of the M. P. A. A., returned from Pictou Saturday evening where they had been in connection with a misunderstanding in the Pictou County Baseball League. The matter was settled satisfactorily.

Yesterday afternoon two valuable dogs died from poisoning which had been administered through the morning. One from an imported breed of purebred colliers, belonging to W.H. Dewar, expired in Victoria Park and is a decided loss to his owner, who valued him highly and had but recently been offered a proportionately high figure for him. The other was owned by S. N. Barle and was a fully trained and pure bred retriever also valued very highly by its owner. A doctor examined one of the animals after death and pronounced the cause to be a heavy dose of strychnine. Both dogs were inoffensive and their loss will be keenly felt by their owners who will endeavor to secure the necessary evidence against the parties who are responsible for their loss.

P. D. Bowlen left last Thursday for Alberta after disposing of his horses. He will be back again during the coming week with another 40 head of Western mares and stallions. Mr Bowlen (or Pat, as he is commonly known) has made a reputation for himself in Elbow as regards selling horses, and the farmers seem to rally around him as soon as they know he is here, as may be judged from the quick sale of the last bunch of horses brought to this town. Talking to Mr Bowlen we learned that he had disposed of 60 head of horses in Elbow during the past 30 days, realizing \$13,000, of course most of these horses are sold on time. Since Jan. 1st, Mr Bowlen has sold 217 horses and over 90 per cent have been bought by farmers in the Elbow District. The farmers are realizing every day the advantages of the western prairie horse (or broncho) has over the eastern horse as to being suited to the climate, and being more hardy; once a broncho is broke, which only takes about a day there is no better work horse. Mr Bowlen has been in the west for the past five years, coming from Prince Edward Island. He has not always been a broncho buyer, as may be known that he was M. P. for four years in the Provincial House for Prince Edward Island, when he was 21 years of age, being the youngest member in the House. He has travelled from coast to coast and been in nearly every town and village in Western Canada that looks better and more prosperous to him than our own little town of Elbow. He has also agreed with the letter signed by "A Farmer" that Elbow should have a fair day and race track, so that the farmers could have an opportunity of judging for themselves the respective merit of the different classes of horses.—The Graphic, Elbow, Sask.
