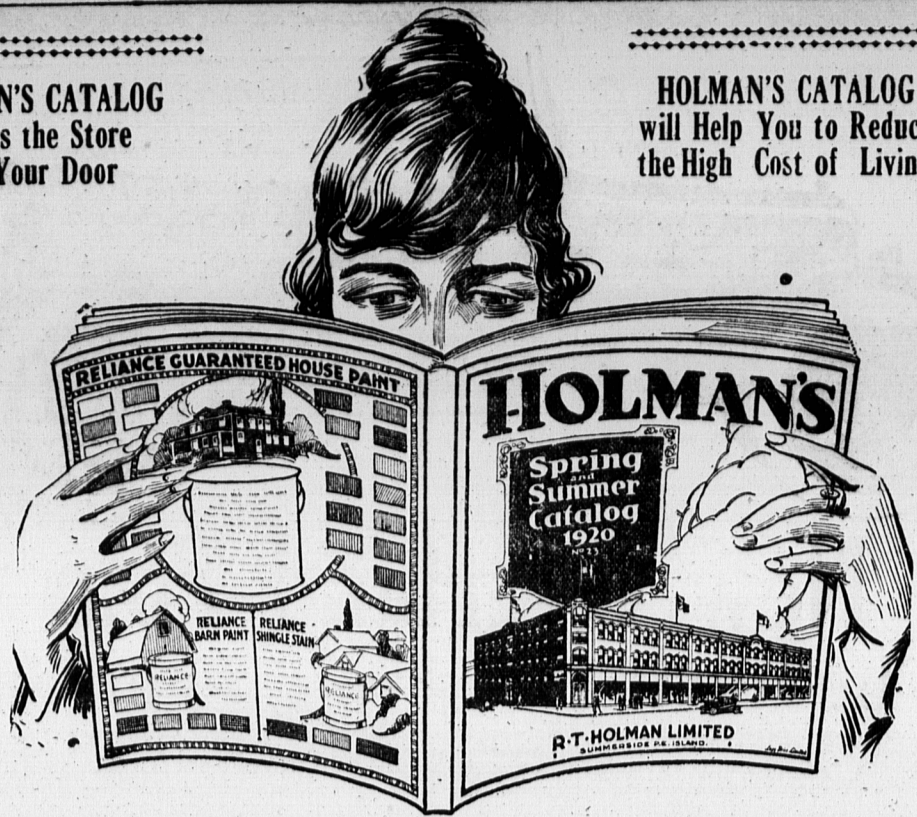


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Closing of the Special Courses

The closing of the classes being held in the Household Science Kitchen, Department of Agriculture, Kindergarten Hall took place yesterday afternoon.

A large number of visitors attended the closing yesterday and the exhibits of the students work.

In millinery, sewing and cooking created much interest.

An especially interesting feature of the work was an exhibit of sewing showing to what good use old materials may be put

The material for this work was supplied the class by Mrs. G. D. Wright and the garments made from these are to be given to the Protestant Orphanage.

A lecture was also shown and is to be given to the P. E. Island Hospital.

The class is deeply grateful to Miss McKinnon, Matron of the Hospital for her excellent and very helpful addresses on home nursing.

Disposition of German Ships

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, May 4.—Six former German warships, the Baden, Helgoland, Posen, Rhineland, Westfalen, and Nuremberg, and 124 submarines have been allocated to Great Britain, according to an announcement in the House of Commons today.

The United States will get the Ostfriesland and Frankfurt, according to the announcement, France has been awarded the Rhurigen and Emden and 38 submarines, Japan will get the Oldenburg, Nasau and Augsburg and Italy will reserve seven submarines. The ships scuttled at Scapa Flow, says the announcement, are to go to Great Britain. Allocation of the remaining 12 light cruisers, 59 destroyers and 50 torpedo boats, the Commons were informed, depends on the selections made by France and Italy from the ships to be surrendered under the Austrian treaty of May.

The announcement by the news papers in Warsaw that the Poles have occupied Kiev is unfounded, says a despatch to the London Times from Warsaw. The Poles, however, have taken Fastov (about 40 miles southwest of Kiev on the railroad) and are continuing to advance the despatch adds.
