REDUCED RATE FOR EMIGRANTS

Negotiations Under Way in London to Obtain Ten Pound Rate.

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—A flat ten pound rate for British emigrants to Canada is under negotiation in London between W. J. Egan, deputy minister of immigration for Canada, and the British government. The rate would be applicable to all British emigrants whether workers in towns or not, providing they can pass the requisite medical inspection.

Steps to obtain the flat ten pound rate have been undertaken in accordance with the recommendation of the house committee which last season investigated immigration. The committee recommended that "measures be taken at an early date to arrange a conference as to the federal and British emigrants and the Atlantic Steamship companies with the object of obtaining a reduction in ocean rates to British immigrants to approximately ten pounds."

SWISS TACTICS AROUSE IRE

Australians are aroused over the recent report of E. Tilley, managing director of a watch case manufacturing concern of Melbourne, on his treatment while in Switzerland to buy additional machinery. Tilley says that the Association of Watch Case Manufacturers in Switzerland were advised of his intentions and an appeal was published in a Swiss newspaper that local manufacturers should not aid foreigners to transplant the watch case industry abroad. All the firms with which he placed orders were warned that if they filled the orders they would be barred from the association. When he secured the machinery from firms outside the organization he was threatened with deportation as an undesirable trader, in the same way as three Japanese and a Canadian were deported some months previously, Tilley said.

CANADA'S TRADE WITH WEST INDIES SHOWS HUGE JUMP IN TWENTY YEARS

Canada's trade with the West Indies has increased from \$2,500,000 in 1898 to \$45,000,000 in 1928, and in the opinion of J. Gill Gardner, Director of the Canadian National Railways, and particularly interested in the steamship end of Canada's big public ownership venture, Canadian trade with these British islands is destined to grow to much greater proportions. Mr. Gardner spoke before the Canadian Club yesterday on the subject of "The Canada-West Indies Trade Treaty and Its Effects."

Paying Tribute

Under the West Indies trade agreement Canada is building by arrangement a fleet of ships especially constructed for tropical cruises, and Mr. Gardner's positive declaration before club members was that such a venture would pay. Furthermore, he declared, the trade arrangement with the islands was one of positive benefit both to Canada and the West Indies, inasmuch as the West Indies had to have goods of the precise character Canada had to offer. And Canada had to have fruits of the character grown in the West Indies. And the oranges and grape fruit of these British islands, Mr. Gardner said, were better than anything which could be produced in either Florida or California.

"Until our new steamship services were in operation—the ships are all refrigerated and will carry the commodities that they have to sell to Canada—it was not expected," he said, "that trade would increase very materially. But in 1926 the total trade was \$37,000,000; in 1927 it was \$37,000,000—that was after the present treaty had been in force one year—and in 1928 it was \$45,000,000. Somebody asked me if I could account for that increase without the transportation and I said yes, sentiment, 100 per cent."

"99,928 Per Cent."

"We hear some people say 'You have just about reached the limit of what can be done between the West Indies and Canada in trade. I am just going to tell you what the possibilities are: in the way of increasing our business. We can increase our business with the islands 149 per cent. in butter, 360 per cent. in boots and shoes, 323 per cent. in cement, 73 per cent. in cheese, 65 per cent. in lard and substitutes, 199 per cent. in lumber, 79 per cent. in milk and oranges—don't think this is any joke because it isn't—according to our business. We can increase Canada, the West Indies can increase their exports to us by 99,928 per cent."

"When you begin to think about this thing there never was a situation that could be so beneficial to two parties to anything like the situation between Canada and the West Indies."

Mr. Gardner told the club that Lord Melchett had expressed to him the conviction that if they would give him the job of directing inter-empire trading, he would make a new Empire.

Dr. Paul Claudel Addresses the Empire Club

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 8.—The ties of the British Empire were sealed on the soil of France, where soldiers from all parts of the empire fought for a common ideal and a common faith, declared Dr. Paul Claudel, French Ambassador to the United States, who addressed the Empire Club today.

Dr. Claudel said in the future of Canada an inspiration in which he was sure the descendants of his country, who were now loyal Canadians and proud of their British allegiance, would play a leading part. He appealed to Canadians not to consider Frenchmen foreigners but a people working earnestly in the interests of good relationship between the British Empire and France, and the peace of the world in general.
