Here is an illustration of the increase in cost of five items.

And no saving can be made on any one of these items. The Hospital must be kept as warm, the patients as well fed as before prices advanced. No great increase can be made in patients fees as it has been the aim of the management to provide first class accommodation at as low a price as possible. Those who are unable to pay are treated free.

It is therefore up to you to say by your response to this appeal whether the Hospital shall lessen, maintain or increase its usefulness.

In order that you may have an opportunity of contributing Queens and King's Counties have been organized by school districts, an executive of three appointed in each district and this executive will appoint collectors who will call on you or shortly after the first of November. Please be ready for them with liberal and increased subscriptions in proportion to the increased cost of everything the Hospital has to buy. It is up to you.
