Residents of the Neighboring Republic have been making trouble by violating the camera rule in Hyde Park: The Daily Mail, in speaking of the American camera fiends says that it is a regulation of the royal parks that you may not take photographs there without an order. The requests for such an order is seldom refused, though, even with one, persons may not be photographed, and on Sunday only hand cameras can be used. The Mail says: Of all this the free-born American is naturally and cheerfully ignorant. Consequently, whenever he takes his walks abroad he takes his camera with him, and anybody whom he calculates to be the King, Lord Salisbury, a duchess, or other desirable subject, he snaphots with an eagerness and a confidence born of democracy. In this he doubly sins; he takes persons, and takes them without a permit. There is a story that Mr. Gladstone was talking with a friend in the park one day, when an American approached and addressed them in these words. "I have been informed that one of you two gentlemen is Mr. Gladstone. I should very much like to know which is it." "I am Mr. Gladstone," said that great man. "Thank you. Will you mind facing this way for a few moments while I adjust my camera?" The ex-premier was too dumfounded not to comply, and today that snaphot adorns the mantelpiece of a man of uncounted millions, whose name has reached the ends of the civilized world.

BOERS PRISONERS START A PAPER.

A London despatch states the Boer prisoners at St. Helena have started printing a weekly paper. The first issue, dated June 7, has just been received in London. The paper bears the title of De Kragsgetfargene, meaning "The Prisoners of War." A sixth of the space of each issue of the St. Helena paper is devoted to religious news. Sporting events are not neglected. The advertisements in this weekly indicate that considerable liberty is allowed the St. Helena prisoners. These advertisements include those of cafes, pawnshops, auctioneers, stores and boarding houses.

A TEST FOR HYPNOTISM.

Gauth Rohm, a son of the late John Rohm, a wealthy lumberman, who disappeared in April, 1893, has been in Renovo, Pa., the last few days in consultation with Svengali, a hypnotist, with a view of enlisting his aid in searching for the missing man's body, and, if Rohm were murdered, to help in fastening the crime upon the guilty party. Svengali will probably go to West Keating township, Clinton county, and make an investigation of the crime.

LIVE WIRES TO WARD OFF STRIKERS.

The State Line and Sullivan Railway Company, which operates coal mines at Bernice, Pa., has adopted a novel plan to prevent striking miners from interfering with the non-union workmen employed in pumping water out of the mines. A barbed wire fence, seven feet high heavily charged with electricity has been built about the pumping house and dynamo plant.
