IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ALEXANDER SMITH

There passed peacefully into rest and to her reward at Perth, P. E. I., on June 4th, Janet Patrick, relict of the late Alexander Smith, who predeceased her four years. Mrs. Smith was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Patrick of Ayrshire, Scotland, and was born there in 1838. At an early age she came to Canada with her parents, the family making their home at Stellarton, N. S., from which place she was married to her late husband in 1867. The young couple took up their residence at once in New Perth in this Province, where eight children came to bless their union. Six of these survive to mourn a much-loved mother, together with thirteen grandchildren. The sons and daughters are: Dr. Alexander B. of Montague; John James, of New Perth; Mrs. A. C. Moran, of Upton; Mrs. John E. Windle, of Murray Harbor; Mrs. H. A. Burdette of Bridgetown and P. A. of New Perth. Mrs. John Johnston of Pictou, N. S., is a sister of the deceased, and the only surviving member of the Patrick family. At the ripe age of eighty-two years this kindly devoted Christian lady passed to her reward, respected and loved by all who knew her. The funeral was held on Monday, June 7th, from her late home, with her sons in New Perth, to Georgetown cemetery. The services at the house and grave were conducted by the pastor Rev. J. 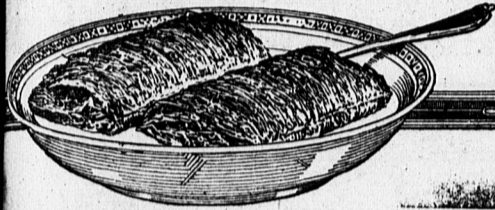
