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PRESBYTERIAL OF W.M.S. AT BELFAST

The P. E. I. Presbyterial of the W. M. S., of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was held in St. John's Church, Belfast, on Thursday, July 6th. The president, Mrs. Arthur Yoe of Tyne Valley, presided at the meetings. In the morning the devotional services were led by Mrs. R. M. Legate, in the afternoon by Mrs. G. O. Webster, and in the evening by Rev. D. L. Griffiths, Minister of Belfast Church.

The musical program was under the direction of Rev. D. L. Griffiths who in the absence of the organist, Miss Annie MacRae, played the organ for the morning and afternoon services. Miss MacRae was accompanied at the evening service. In the afternoon a very pleasing solo "May I Come In" was given by Mr. David Griffiths. At the evening service two special numbers were given by Belfast Choir. One number, "The Children and Mission" is worthy of special mention. The music for it has been composed by Rev. D. L. Griffiths, who is a native of Wales. It was originally written in Welsh, was translated into English and later into various Indian languages. The solo parts were well taken by Master Kenneth Griffiths, of Huntingdon Academy, Quebec, who is now visiting his father at the manse.

There were present representatives from twenty eight of the thirty auxiliaries which compose the P. E. I. Presbyterial. Besides the delegates over two hundred visitors were present. These included nearly all the members of the P. E. I. Presbytery.

Lafferty, Charlottetown; the Home Mission Secretary, Mrs. J. Stanley Brown, New London; the Historical Secretary, Mrs. W. A. Stewart, Charlottetown; the Home Helpers' Secretary, Mrs. G. W. The greetings of the Belfast congregation were brought by the pastor, Rev. D. L. Griffiths, who spoke of the well known hospitality of the people of Belfast and extended to all present a hearty welcome. The greetings of the P. E. I. Presbytery were brought by the moderator, Rev. To understand this, to experience it and to testify by word and life is a task for every Christian. St. Paul expresses the will of God for us "that ye, through his poverty might be rich." He suggests the call for justice and fairness in the distribution of the good things of life. He tells of the life that is more than material, the wealth that is eternal, the life abundant, the mind set free, the conscience unburdened, the broad, generous, magnanimous outlook. He who emptied his life that ours may be filled, who through his humble humanity has entered into all our problems calls upon us today to take his name and enter into his heritage.

Miss Berna Huestis sang a very feelingly Scott's "Come ye blessed." At the evening service, the Rev. A. K. Herman delivered an interesting address on "Worth hearing." Mr. V. L. Dingwell's rich baritone voice was heard effectively in his worshipful selection.

My first thought is to congratulate the Flower Committee on the very attractive display of poolies, in varied colors, which adorned the pulpit platform. It was pleasing to have such a large congregation present in the morning and to see among those present a number of strangers. This will no doubt be the rule for the next two or three months and ushers and others should speak to strangers and invite them to come again; a hearty handshake will add much weight to the invitation. Remember hand-shaking has not gone out of style. A hearty Christian greeting will do much to make our church prosper.

Miss Jean MacGregor, Field Secretary for the W. M. S. of the eastern division in the afternoon conducted a question box and answered many questions in connection with problems, constitution and finance. Among her answers was the one that St. James W. M. S. was the largest contributor of the auxiliaries this year and that Zion Mission Band led the bands in numbers and finance. In the evening instead of answering questions, she put to the audience some pertinent question regarding missionary work and their part in it. She spoke of the first society started at Malpeque in 1825, and of the beginning of the present society fifty seven years ago. It has grown from a membership of one hundred and seventy-eight to over four thousand. She closed with an appeal to her hearers to make missions one of the most vital interests in their lives.

Rev. G. C. Webster announced that the summer school for young people would not be held this year, but that Dr. Kanawin would visit the Island later and meet with the young people and their leaders.
