THE GENUINE PICTURES COMING.

Vivid as are the scenes that are thrown on the screen during the so-called moving pictures of San Francisco's horror which has hitherto been offered they could not possibly be genuine for the very good reason that the makers were on this side of the Rocky Mountains when the fire was raging. With the Miles Bros. pictures at the Opera House Aug 8 and 9 it is different, and the management is willing to forfeit the gross receipts of one performance to anyone who can prove that the pictures are not genuine. 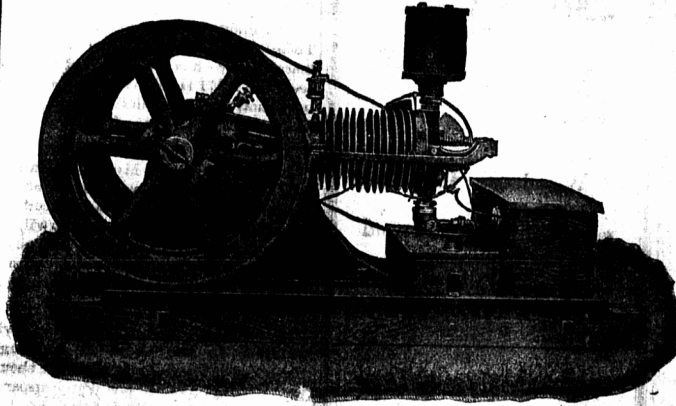
