The Guardian is in receipt of the following in a letter from an esteemed correspondent:—"My attention has been called to the poem entitled 'My Native Land' which appeared in the magazine section of The Guardian under date of February 16, 1917. Evidently the copy which reached your office was not entirely accurate, for as you have printed it, there is a slight limp in the last line of the sixth verse. As the self confessed author of this poem, kindly permit me to correct the line. In my original copy it reads: 'We surely never can forget.' Perhaps a better wording would have been: 'We never can forget will forget.' The word 'surely' did not occur in the original draft. Turning to matters of more importance, I am glad that Charlottetown has a daily, so new, progressive, and well-edited as The Guardian. It would do credit to a much larger city, and it should receive substantial support, not only from the business men but from the farmers of the Island.

Washington just now has "Congress on its hands," as Mr. Cleveland used to describe the situation. The "short session" ends at noon on March 4th, and as usual, the last week of the session opens with much important legislation all unfinished. During this session, Congress has very generously raised the pay of its own members from \$5,000 to \$7,500 per annum, on account of the increased cost of living. At this season of the year, the streets of Washington present their liveliest appearance. The automobiles and carriages of the wealthy winter residents are very much in evidence, as well as the large sight-seeing automobiles filled with tourists, who come here in great numbers while Congress is in session. But here, as in all other cities, there is poverty in the background of the picture. Most of the unskilled labor in this city is done by the colored people, who make up one-third of the population.—The Jamestown Exposition, which is to be held in Norfolk, Va., during the coming summer, is expected to attract a good many visitors to this section of the country.—Wm. TELEGRAMS received in the city last night from the Abegweit hockey team, who have been for four days on Pictou Island, stated that the members of the team had walked yesterday morning to Pictou via Caribou. They then went by train to Sackville. It is not probable that they will cross the Cape today as they would reach Sackville too late to make connection with Cape Tormentine.

WILLIAM C. MCKAY, who has occupied the position of accountant for The Prince Edward Island Telephone Company for the past two and a half years, has resigned his position, and will leave for Western Canada at the end of the present month. Mr. McKay's departure from the City and Province will be greatly regretted. He has always been a faithful, upright and admirable citizen, popular with a very large number of acquaintances and warmly esteemed for his fine qualities by his intimate friends. Previous to his taking the position with the Telephone Co. he was book-keeper for the well known firm of Bruce Stewart & Co for about five years. In his engagements as book-keeper, his duties have always been scrupulously and ably performed. While resigning his leaving his native Province to enter a field of larger opportunities, where there is little doubt of his future success, all his friends will join heartily in the wish that the best of good fortune will speedily reward his endeavors.

An aged mother in Israel departed this life on February 15th, at Little Bras d'Or, Catherine MacDonald, widow of John Campbell, mother of Rev. Malcolm Campbell of Gabarus. She was born some ninety-five years ago at Mingahish, Isle of Skye. When she was a lass of about eight years, the family moved to Skeabost, which became her home until the year of her marriage and emigration to Cape Breton. Their own parish minister Rev. Rory MacLeod of Kensale Parish of Sirois, being away from home, Rev. Coll. MacDonald of Fortree agreed to meet the young couple halfway, and did so, meeting them at the school-house of Berre, in which they were married. That was in the spring of 1841, and about the first of August the young couple sailed for America, coming over in the "John Walker". They were of a dozen or so of the passengers who landed at Sydney, the rest going on to Quebec. Their first Cape Breton home was in Middle River, where they lived for some twenty-six years. In 1868 they moved to Big Intervale, Cape North, where twenty years later on, Mr. Campbell died, April 22nd 1888. Seventeen years ago Widow Campbell came with her son John to Planters, North Shore, where he had bought the Squire Buchanan place. Eight years ago he came to Little Bras d'Or bringing his mother with him. Besides the two sons, three daughters mourn one of the best of mothers. "Her children arise up, and call her blessed". The daughters are: Ann, widow of Donald Morrison, Middle Ridge, Cape North; Isabelle, wife of Donald Morrison of Middle Ridge Cape North; and Sarah wife of Murdoch MacDonald of North Sydney. Notwithstanding her great age Mrs. Campbell was in perfect possession of all her faculties to the last.—Presbyterian Witness. Many readers in Prince Edward Island will be interested in the above, as the deceased was known to numbers of people throughout the Province.
