LOCAL BRIEFS

THE tug A.C. Whiteley arrived in Pictou Saturday to tow a large barge to Boston via Halifax.

A MEETING of the lady members of the Charlottetown Lawn Tennis Club and of the tea members will be held on Tuesday next the 6th inst at 11.30 a.m. in parlour of Y. M. C. A.

TO-NIGHT is the night for the lecture on "The Colored Races" by J. T. Mellich, Esq., in Grace Church Mission free. A silver collection will be taken for the parsonage furnishing fund.

At the meeting of the Mount Allison board of regents, held after the university closing exercises, Rev. On Monday night last some unknown man entered the residence of an elderly woman living alone in a house about a mile from the village of Eldon and attempted to criminally assault her. The unknown party made his way into the woman's house by removing the lower sash from a window. He then went upstairs to the woman's sleeping apartment and a fierce struggle ensued. Her screams he smothered by placing a pillow over her mouth, tying her hands with a handkerchief and threatened her with a knife. For the dastardly purpose of his visit was thwarted by the woman's heroic struggle in defence of honor. She succeeded in making her escape in her night clothes, and barefooted she ran to the nearest neighbors. It was found necessary to send for a doctor as she had been nearly faint. A search was made but no trace of the perpetrator has been found. The case has been reported to the authorities and a detective in charge.
