Only one carton of eggs was forwarded to Britain yesterday. It would appear that the greatly increased demand from Maritime points will take care of the surplus receipts. 1,900 cases of A grades were forwarded to Maritime points yesterday. The surplus is being sent to the driers at Three Rivers, Que. No change in prices. Some broilers are being marketed at local prices. The price of broilers is 33 cents per lb. dressed. Baby chick sales are at their peak. Many orders cannot be filled locally.

ON VISIT HERE—A visitor to Charlottetown this week is Mr. R. H. K. Marett, of the United Kingdom Information Office, Ottawa, who is touring the Maritime Provinces in connection with his duties. A native of the island of Jersey, Mr. Marett has spent the last few months at home a few months ago, and found it intact after the German occupation. This is the slogan used by the International Association of Chiefs of Police in their 1946 Traffic Safety Check, beginning May 15, when police officers in the United States and Canada will check the brakes, lights, tires, windshield wipers and horns of motor vehicles. Last year 28,500 cars were checked and a million persons were injured in automobile accidents. This frightful toll can be stopped, the police assert, when all motorists insert in their cars a Traffic Safety Check by City of Charlottetown.

For the convenience of car drivers, members here will be established on Church Street, starting May 15th at 10 A. M., and open till 6 P. M. Senator Opposes Canada Day Bill

OTTAWA, May 14 (CP)—Senator J. W. Ferris (L-British Columbia) today appealed to the members of the Upper Chamber to kill the bill which would change the name of "Dominion Day" to "Canada Day". The bill already has passed the Commons.

Dominion Day, he said, commemorates an historic fact, the union of Upper and Lower Canada and the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. He referred to the debates in the Senate in 1879 when the bill setting aside July 1 as Dominion Day was passed. There was no doubt in that debate that the name should be Dominion Day. It consecrated the birth of Canada. From then until now the name has been used and has been taught loyalty to Canada in keeping Dominion Day.

The meaning of Dominion Day has changed through the years just as the meaning of Canada, originally "a collection of huts," has changed. "Dominion" meant the Dominion which the people of Canada held over this great land. There was nothing humiliating in the word, nothing that indicated Canada was not a free country.

He said that the name "Dominion" gave the impression Canada was under the domination of the United Kingdom or England's King. The name of Canada alone dominated Canada.

To the objection that people in the United States did not understand Canada was independent and looked upon Dominion Day as supporting their view of this country, Senator Ferris said Canada should not change the name of its national day to accommodate the ignorance of anyone. Canadians knew what it meant and were deeply concerned with its associations.

Duff (L-Nova Scotia) moved the adjournment of the debate until tomorrow.

URGENT NEED FOR MORE HOME GARDENS

Emphasizing the fact that an increased number of home gardens will help to meet the desperate need for food, the Hon. the Minister of Agriculture, Mr. F. G. Stewart, said today in a speech before the House of Commons.

A quarter of a million Victory Gardens would be a suitable goal for the Dominion of Canada. The food produced in these gardens will make possible increased shipments of staple products such as wheat, meat, cheese and eggs to the people in several countries. The 226,000 home gardens planted in the Dominion last year produced 1,944,000 pounds of potatoes, carrots, beans, peas, onions and other garden produce.

There is ample seed available on the market, as well as tools and fertilizer to meet the needs of the home gardener. A helpful pamphlet entitled "The Wartime Garden" may be obtained free from the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Enthusiasm, regardless of federal government regulations, say they, will be the key to the success of the home garden. Ranchers Fancy Golden Palomino

EDMONTON, May 14 (CP)—The Palomino, golden horse of the golden west, has captured the fancy of ranchers of the foothills province of Alberta—but in the cold book of rules—he has a strike against them.

The Palomino, which boasts a golden coat and silver mane, was originally a thoroughbred. The type was crossed with the cream-colored "buckskin mare" of the Indian golden horse.

Alberta has possibly a dozen of the Palomino stallions, agricultural authorities say, but not recognized as breeding stock eligible for registration under the federal stallion enrollment act.

The reason is that whatever the attractions of the type, they did not breed true to color. For example, a gangly-legged colt sired by a chestnut stallion bred to a Palomino mare produced a foal of pure color and hence would be ineligible for enrollment among the golden horses.

The states of Colorado and Texas have Palomino stock books of their own, but even these states, which contain horse fanciers aplenty, do not recognize the golden breed.

These considerations matter little, however, to those Alberta horsemen who have turned to raising Palominos. Regardless of lineage, they say, the Palomino is a beautiful and intelligent animal of even temper, capable of turning with equanimity from the show ring to the trail path or the work of rop-

INYO, Cal., May 15—Roaring over the sun-baked wastes of Death Valley at better than 440 m.p.h., the Army's newest reconnaissance plane, the twin-engine Northrop T-15 Reporter, made its debut before a dazzled group of Army observers and reporters.

A direct descendant of the war-tested Black Widow night fighter, the twin-boom Reporter is designed for high speed photographic missions of more than 4,000 miles. Such long-range missions were formerly limited to heavy four-engine bombers.

The ship carries a two-man crew and six remote-control cameras. At 440 m.p.h., it is one of the world's fastest propeller-driven planes and easily able to avoid interceptors.
