REGATTA AT SOURIS

Light Wind Interfered With Fast Time.

LARGE CROWD PRESENT

The Souris People Delighted With the Day's Sport.

THE yacht race at Souris, which had been looked forward to with a great deal of interest has come and gone. The train from the city brought a large number while the attendance by carriage fully equalled the expectations of those who had the matter in charge. Unfortunately the wind was too light for fast work. The following is a list of the boats entered in the race:—Mamie 3rd owned by John McPhee, Annadale, sailed by himself. Lena May, owned by Harry McLean, sailed by Frank McDonald, Charlottetown. Myrtle E. owned by James Hemphill, Georgetown; Anita owned by Mr. Saunders, Pannure Island; Petrel, owned E. McKenzie, sailed by Frank Cheverie.

Pearl, owned by H. Acorn, sailed by himself. Minnie, owned by L. Bachelier, sailed by himself. Myrtle, owned and sailed by Dennis Brown, Georgetown. At 1.45 the boats got away. Mamie 3rd, leading. Myrtle, 2nd with Lena May 3rd.

At the first stake boat Lena May was three minutes ahead with Mamie 3rd, 2nd, Myrtle 3rd, Anita 4th. After the first course two boats withdrew and the boats finished in the following order:—Lena May, 1st, arriving at 2½ minutes past 6 p. m. Mamie 3rd, 2nd, 13 minutes past 6. Myrtle 4th; Petrel 5th. The other boats being considerably in the rear.

The Lena May wins the cup with \$15 in cash; Mamie 3rd, wins \$12 in cash, Anita \$8 in cash, Myrtle \$6 in cash and Petrel \$4 in cash. The race was over a triangular course. The regatta was finished with a dory race in which there were three entries, with prize offered by Mr. D. Nicholson. The first prize was won by Doyle Bros being 12 pounds of tobacco. The second prize of 8 pounds of tobacco was won by John Higgins and Joseph Dorion, while the third was won by Gerion Bros. the prize being 6 pounds of tobacco.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL

From Rev. John MacInnis.

SIR:—A word of encouragement. I have followed the "Police Chairmanship" controversy as published in your paper, with much interest. I wish to congratulate you for your courage and faithfulness in the whole matter. Taking the fact as stated by you in the last issue of the SEMI-WEEKLY GUARDIAN to my mind, there can be no controversy as to the true and clear course to be pursued in the matter.

Had we learned that a man convicted of a deliberate and repeated violation of the law had been appointed, and stubbornly retained as "Chairman of Police," in the city of Chicago or New York we could have understood how under the conditions prevailing there at present that could be possible. But when we read that that is the real condition of affairs in Charlottetown we could hardly believe the statement as made in THE GUARDIAN. We waited for we thought that there must surely have been some misunderstanding in the matter. But alas, only to find that it is too true. True in the first city of P. E. Island, our native land, to which we have pointed recently—and with pride—as an example of what people can do in the way of temperance reform when they set themselves to it.

We are no less surprised at the course pursued by the two evening papers in this matter. We are astonished to find that a paper in a city like Charlottetown should endeavor to present a philosophy to justify such an incongruous, not to say unrighteous civic course. Such a philosophy cannot but have a harmful influence upon the young men who read it. This kind of weak apologizing for corruption in political life may have something to do with the lamentable state of affairs brought to light in some parts of the Island during the recent election trials. I notice that a young man who lives near my old home was arrested for perjury the other day.

I remember of having heard a man say some years ago what I thought fairly well represented the thought of that community at that time. He said "I would not take an oath for the sake of a vote even though I were positive that every word I should say would be as true as the Bible." I suppose that the young man who took the false oath at the very poll near which the above words were uttered came to think, as a good many of the young people seem to think now, that what is wrong and to be condemned in other circumstances is proper political ethics. And we cannot wonder at our young people thinking in this way, when those in authority trifle with infractions of the law and at times seem to put special value upon those who most daringly set it at naught. Certainly the course pursued by the authorities at Charlottetown in this special case seems to be putting a premium on lawlessness.

I most sincerely hope that you have the warm sympathy and hearty co-operation of every lover of civic righteousness on P. E. Island in your commendable opposition to this kind of thing. The condition of affairs evidenced by this incident and the recent election trials ought surely to serve the church of God on P. E. I. as a clarion call to a more active and uncompromising warfare against the moral cancer of political corruption that would for one moment interfere with the enforcement of righteous laws and thus endanger the very liberty of people. I tell you the liberty of the people is in far greater danger from the lax winking at the open violation of righteous law than it is from the speedy and uncompromising execution of the same.

You have my heartfelt sympathy in the stand which you have taken. May the Lord of battles make you strong in the right!
